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RUTH BAIZE TO SPEAK

Mrs. Ruth Baize, a '74 USI graduate and one of 36 Walt Disney American Teacher Award winners selected across the nation last year, will speak at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, February 5, in Forum I in a special appearance sponsored by the USI chapter of Kappa Delta Pi.

Mrs. Baize, a Kappa Delta Pi member, holds a master's degree from Texas Christian University and is a teacher at Lodge School in Evansville, where her creative techniques won her the Disney honor. Her students currently are participating in a program developed through a Lilly Endowment Teacher Creativity Fellowship for study of the American Revolution in the U.S. and England.

Her topic at USI will be "What You Can Do To Become an Outstanding Teacher," presenting ideas on innovative practices for classroom application. All students, faculty, and staff members are invited to attend, with a special invitation issued to prospective teachers.

VISITING SCHOLAR

The School of Nursing and Health Professions will present its first annual Visiting Scholar in Residence -- Dr. Patricia Gray, an associate professor and coordinator of graduate programs in nursing at the Georgia State University College of Health Sciences -- on Tuesday, February 11.

Dr. Gray will speak at 11 a.m. in UC350 on the topic "Caring in Nursing Practice and Nursing Education." Dr. Gray also will talk

with nursing students, starting at 8:30 a.m. at Deaconess Hospital, and speak to the faculty at 1:30 p.m. in UC350. All sessions are open to all interested students, faculty, and staff members.

Dr. Gray received her Ph.D. in 1982 from the University of Utah and is a recognized leader in the innovative use of caring to enhance patient-care outcomes. She has discussed this topic before a variety of audiences, with special emphasis on teaching caring concepts to college students.

PANELS TO PREPARE FOR ENLOW SCHOLAR

Community panels have been organized to heighten awareness of the important Bill of Rights issue on censorship in preparation for the visit March 26-27 of the 1992 Enlow Distinguished Scholar, Mr. Anthony Jones, president of the School of the Art Institute of Chicago.

The first community panel on "Censorship in Schools and Community" will be held at 7 p.m. Wednesday, February 5, at the Red Bank Branch of the Evansville Public Library. Panelists will be Mr. James Wooten, Central High School teacher; Ms. Marcia Au, assistant director, Evansville-Vanderburgh Public Libraries; the Rev. Brenda Steproe, Evansville minister; and Mr. John Gibson, USI English lecturer. Dr. Charles T. Barber, chair of the USI Philosophy and Political Science Department, will be moderator. Their discussion will focus on minors' rights to free speech and access to information; public funding and the First Amendment; censorship of books, videos, and movies; freedom of speech and the flag; and academic freedom.

"Is Censorship Justified? When?" will be the topic for the second community panel at 7 p.m. Wednesday, February 19, in the Evansville Courier Community Room. Dr. David W. Drebus-

enko, USI assistant professor of philosophy, will moderate a panel made up of Mr. Paul McAuliffe, executive director, Evansville Courier Company; Rabbi Arthur Abrams of Adath B'nai Israel Temple; and Mr. Michael Lee Gradison, American Civil Liberties Union in Indiana. They will discuss the right to assemble and public safety, hate crimes and speech, national security and the First Amendment, and freedom of the press.

The Enlow Distinguished Scholar series annually brings an authority on arts and humanities to USI as guest lecturer. Mr. Jones also serves as chief officer of the Art Institute of Chicago, a world-famous art museum that was embroiled in a 1989 censorship battle over a student art show exhibit involving the American flag. Veterans groups protested and 2,500 veterans and supporters marched on the Art Institute. The exhibit led to Congressional legislation to regulate display of the American flag.

Mr. Jones' topic, "Stars and Bras: A Report from the Trenches," will deal with the issue of censorship in the arts and its impact on education. He will speak at 7 p.m. March 26 in Forum I. Public attendance is urged for the community panels and Mr. Jones presentation.

Counselors from the USI Student Financial Assistance, Bursar's, and Registrar's offices will be on hand to assist students and their parents in filling out financial aid forms that are due March 1 to make students eligible for assistance next fall.
