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DR. SINGER APPOINTED DIRECTOR OF GRADUATE CENTER. Dr. Sandra M. Singer, USI associate professor of psychology, has been appointed the first director of the Evansville Graduate Studies Center, effective July 1. The Center will be located in the Carpenter Home in downtown Evansville and will be a cooperative program of USI, Indiana, Purdue, Ball State, and Indiana State universities, and the University of Evansville. It has been approved by and is receiving priority support from the Indiana Commission for Higher Education for development of graduate study opportunity for residents of southwest Indiana. A 1985-86 ICHE study found that the Evansville area is underserved in public graduate programs, compared to other areas of the state. The commission recommendation cites the need for programs in business, engineering, nursing, public affairs, and elementary and secondary education.

Dr. Singer will be responsible for developing and administering the operating policies and procedures and coordinating activities which support successful development of the Center. She also will assess the needs for graduate programs of instruction and applied research in Region 13 of southwest Indiana.

Dr. Singer received her B.A. degree in 1969, her M.A. in 1972, and her Ph.D. in developmental psychology in 1975, all from the University of Colorado at Boulder, where she was research administrator for the Institute for Behavioral Genetics (1978-80), research administrator and instructor (1975-77), and research psychologist and project manager (1973-75). She also has been a lecturer (1972-73) at Hawaii Loa College and a postdoctoral fellow in psychiatric genetics (1977-78) at the University of Iowa. Dr. Singer came to USI in 1980 as an assistant professor of psychology and was named an associate professor in 1984. She is involved in autism research, currently working on a "Dermatoglyphics and Autism" study funded by the Stallone Foundation for the Study of Autism.

Dr. Singer's professional and community activities include being a 1986-87 board member and vice president for membership of Leadership Evansville; 1985-86 president of Southwestern Indiana Psychological Association; and a board member of the CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) program in the Vanderburgh County Juvenile Court and of VOICES, Evansville's state-appointed ombudsman organization for consumers of nursing home care. Dr.

Singer also has been a consultant in the pre-retirement counseling program at Whirlpool Corporation since 1982, and at General Foods Corporation since 1985. Since 1978, she has been a reviewer for Science Books and Films of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and has been the author or co-author of articles and papers for 29 professional journals and meetings, with two more now in preparation. She and her husband, Dr. Allan R. Kuse, have two children.

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USI ARTISTS WIN AWARDS. Mr. John McNaughton, USI professor of art, was selected as a \$500 fifth-place winner in the second annual Whirlpool Sculpture Competition with his entry, "I Think I Have a Screw Loose." Artists from 14 states were invited to enter the competition, with the 44 award winners to be included in a touring exhibition that will be on display at the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science July 27-August 24 and at three other art centers in Michigan, Arkansas, and Florida. Mr. McNaughton won the grand prize in last year's inaugural competition.

Ms. Kathryn Waters, USI assistant professor of art, was presented a \$750 purchase award in the Evansville Museum's "Realism Today" competition, which will be on display until July 20. Ms. Waters won for her pastel, "Six A.M." Her "Waiting for the Greyhound" also will be exhibited. She and four other Evansville area artists will be featured in an "Evansville on Paper, Part III" exhibition at the Museum July 15-August 10.

CHINESE ARTIST TO LECTURE. Ms. Diana Kan, an internationally acclaimed artist, will present a lecture demonstration on Chinese painting at 7 p.m. Friday, June 13, at the Entry House in the New Harmony Inn, sponsored by Red Geranium Enterprises. Admission is \$2. Ms. Kan, a native of Hong Kong, began studying calligraphy with her late father, **Mr. Kan Kam Shek,** and later studied at the Art Students League in New York and the Ecole des Beaus Arts in Paris. Her book, The How and Why of Chinese Painting, has become a standard text in college art courses of this genre across the nation. She is represented in collections of the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the Philadelphia Museum of Art, among others.
