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11 Presidential Scholars enroll in fall classes

Eleven Indiana high school valedictorians and salutatorians will enter USI classes this fall, becoming the Presidential Scholars of the Class of 2000.

Presidential Scholarships were inaugurated by the USI Foundation in 1988 to attract top Hoosier students to the University. The basic program assures Presidential Scholars that tuition fees, books, and room and board — valued at up to \$4,500 in 1988, now worth up to \$6,600 a year — will be provided so long as the students continue to meet eligibility criteria. Funding for the program is private, coming from the USI Foundation and various individual and corporate donors in southern Indiana, primarily Evansville. Because the program is so popular, participation eventually outstripped financial resources and led to a reluctant decision to place a competitive limit on the number of Presidential Scholars who

would be accepted in the 1996 program.

There are 74 Presidential Scholars currently enrolled at USI. Daviess County has had the largest number over the life of the program, followed by Clark, Vanderburgh, and Warrick counties. There are 67 Presidential Scholar graduates, 54 of them graduating with honors — six summa cum laude, 31 magna cum laude, and 15 cum laude. The 1996 scholars include:

Latuch of Charlestown, Indiana; English/psychology major; graduate of Charlestown High School, Clark County (4.0 GPA on 4.0 scale); placed in several events in Science Olympiad and Academic Superbowl; active member of Latin and French clubs, National Honor Society, and Natural Helpers; Girls State alternate; pianist; active with church youth group and as church lector/volunteer.

Stone named women's soccer coach

Mr. Greg Stone, women's soccer coach since 1988 at Anderson College in South Carolina, has been named the first head coach for women's soccer at USI. He led a trial program at Anderson to a 103-23-4 record, three straight Region 10 championships, and several trips to National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) regional and national tournaments. He was named the Region 10 Coach of the Year in 1990, '91, '92, '93, and the NSCAA Umbro East Region Coach of the Year in '92. In 1995, he helped the Anderson program make the transition from junior college status to compete in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics as a four-year institution. His team also won the national championship in the National Christian Collegiate Athletic Association last year.

A native of Miami, he is a 1988 graduate of Erskine College in Due West, South Carolina, where he was co-captain of men's soccer and selected to the All-District team. While at Anderson, he also was assistant coach for men's soccer and a part of the Olympic Development Program in South Carolina from 1988 to 1994.
