As health topics of interest are identified Mrs. Little will arrange informal rap sessions for small groups. Mrs. Little's office, Rm. 116, is located in the Dean of Student and Academic Affairs suite.

UNIVERSITY CENTER DEVELOPMENT

The designing stage of the University Student Center is nearing completion. Students visited a number of Student Union buildings last spring to look for ideas to report to the architect. The design architect will discuss the schematic area relationships with campus personnel in mid-September. Preliminary discussions have focussed upon student activities and service space on the mall level, food services and meeting rooms on the second level with a connecting bridge between the Center and the Library, and a roof-top garden for outdoor dances and activities. The University Center was approved for construction by the 1969 General Assembly, and construction financing plans were approved by the State Budget Agency and University Board of Trustees last spring. provides the funds for designing, constructing, financing, equipping, and operating the University Center facilities and programs.

The total fees for all regional campuses are now approximately equal. Since 1969 the fees of the regional campuses of Indiana University have been \$600 (30 hrs. x \$20) and for the Purdue University regional campuses, \$690.

FALL FILM SERIES ANNOUNCED

Dr. James Blevins, Chairman of the ISUE Arts Commission, released the film series schedule for the 1971 Fall Semester. The following films appear on the schedule:

September 28, Passion of Joan of Arc, and Melie's Trip to the Moon; October 5, Alfie; October 12, Seven Samurai; October 19, To Die in Madrid; October 26, Elvira Madigan; November 2, Midnight Cowboy; November 9, the Blue Angel; November 16, Blow Up; November 23, How I Won the War, and Homo Homini; November 30, 8½; December 7, Relativity, Man and Dog Out for Air, Horse Over Teakettle, That's Me, and other films; December 14, Triumph of the Will; January 4, The Killing; and January 11, Hour of the Wolf.

The films will be shown on the Evansville Campus in the spacious Blue Room of the administrative wing. The films will be shown at 2:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. on the dates listed.

Season tickets can be purchased at the Bursar's Office after September 9. Tickets are \$7.50. General admission for any one showing is \$1.00.

Bent Twig is being developed as a natural preserve representative of the Southern Indiana environment. Students and visitors are welcome to stroll along the trails. ROBERT OWEN BICENTENNIAL

The Robert Owen Bicentennial Conference sponsored by the ISUE Department of History and Harmonie Associates of New Harmony, Indiana, will be held on October 15 and 16 at the Thrall Opera House in New Harmony, Indiana. Historians from Great Britain and America will present papers related to Robert Owen's work and thought. Featured speakers will be Dr. John F. C. Harrison, University of Sussex, England; Dr. Merle Curti of the University of Wisconsin; and Dr. Robert Clouse of Indiana State University.

The Conference will conclude with a concert of period music by the Pro Arte Ensemble of Indiana University.
