DR. WANDA HIBBITTS HONORED. Dr. Wanda Best Hibbitts, associate professor of business since 1973, was presented the National City Bank Distinguished Professor Award at USI's first Honors Day on April 17. The award is a faculty recognition for colleagues who have demonstrated a dedication to teaching and a quest for excellence. Dr. Hibbitts' nomination included comments from more than 20 colleagues and current and past students, all in agreement that she has maintained the highest level of academic skill in order that she might better teach those who crowd into her classes. Both faculty and students were appreciative that she always finds time to assist them, whether in class work, in finding a job, or in problems encountered on the job long after graduation. She is recognized for innovative teaching techniques, with the academic excellence of the USI accounting program evidenced by the outstanding performance of its graduates who sit for the Indiana CPA examinations and their recruitment by national, regional, and local accounting firms.

Dr. Hibbitts is an Evansville native who grew up in Owensboro, Kentucky. She received her A.B. degree in business education from Western Kentucky University in 1943 and held accounting and other office jobs in private industry prior to becoming an accounting teacher at Lockyear College of Business in 1956. Dr. Hibbitts remained there until enrolling in Indiana State University in 1969 to start work on her M.B.A. She was a graduate assistant in the ISU Accounting Department during that time. She joined the USI faculty in 1970, became a Certified Public Accountant in 1973, and earned her Ph.D. in 1984.

Dr. Hibbitts maintains membership in six professional organizations, is past president of the American Society of Women Accountants, and currently serves on the board of the Indiana Association of CPAs (southern region). She has worked with Junior Achievement and was responsible for the organization of volunteers to provide income tax assistance to elderly and indigent citizens in Evansville and Mt. Vernon. She organized and has served as faculty advisor to the League of Professional Women and the Accounting Club, and has been an active member of numerous faculty and university committees. Dr. Hibbitts also has operated her own public accounting business, has been a consultant on numerous accounting system development projects in the area, annually prepares tax returns for individuals and small businesses, and currently is serving as an expert witness on accounting procedures in a multi-million dollar legal action pending in U.S. District Court, having been recruited by a major Indianapolis law firm on the basis of her prestigious reputation in the areas of Accounting and Auditing Standards.

PRESIDENT'S MEDALLION PRESENTED TO BUSINESS GRADUATE. **Mrs. Janet Seiler**, a senior management major who has attained a 3.91 grade point average while attending classes full time and working full time, was chosen as the 1986 recipient of the USI President's Medallion, an award established by the faculty to recognize a graduating senior who has excelled academically and has given service to the University and community. Mrs. Seiler received enthusiastic support for the award from her employer, Kahn, Dees, Donovan & Kahn, and from her instructors. She has been a legal secretary and paralegal with the law firm since 1980 and also has found time to be a member of the Perry Township Volunteer Fire Department and Indiana Volunteer Fireman's Association, and vice president of the Suburban Fire Association. She is past chairman of the Bylaws and Public Relations committees of the Perry Township department. Mrs. Seiler's community activities also have included volunteer work with the Channel 9 Auction and the Republican Party. She was one of 36 charter members inducted earlier this year into the USI Alpha Iota Chapter of the national scholastic honorary, Alpha Chi. She also is a member of the National Paralegal Association and was the recipient of the USI Academic Scholarship and the George Abshier Faculty Recognition Scholarship.

USI STUDENT IS FIRST TZSCHOPPE RECIPIENT. **Mr. Michael Gilles**, a sophomore majoring in business administration, was selected as the first recipient of the Philip and Agnes Tzschorpe Scholarship for Study in Osnabruck, West Germany, presented at the April 17 Honors Day. He will attend the University of Osnabruck and the Fachhochschule (Business Institute) in 1986-87, and will live with a German farm family in Schleswig-Holstein. After graduation from USI, he intends to continue the combination of business and German studies at a major graduate school of international business. The scholarship, made possible by Mr. and Mrs. Philip Tzschorpe of Tzschorpe Industries Recycling, is a first step in a planned long-range exchange of students and faculty between USI and the university in Osnabruck, Evansville's sister city.

SOLIDARITY OFFICIAL TO SPEAK. **Mr. Marek Garztecki**, a public information officer in London for the Polish Solidarity organization who is on a U.S. tour as a guest of American trade unions, will speak at USI on Wednesday, April 30, in two programs sponsored by the USI Campus Ministry. He will speak on "Solidarity, Church, and Government: Poland 1986" at 1 p.m. in Forum II, and on "Trade Union Solidarity in Poland: Past, Present, and Future" at 7 p.m. in UC 350. Both meetings are open to the public; there will be question-and-answer periods.
