UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN INDIANA
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USI ENROLLMENT CONTINUES UPWARD. The fall enrollment at the University climbed to 4,333, up 308 over 1985 or a 7.65 percent increase. It was the largest increase since 1981, when 10 percent growth was recorded. The enrollment figures from the Registrar's Office show 2,126 freshmen, 749 sophomores, 663 juniors, 642 seniors, 11 graduate, 130 special undergraduate, and 12 special graduate students are enrolled this fall. The total includes 3,027 full-time students, an increase of 607 over '85, and 1,306 part-time students, a decrease of 299.

A detailed report on student characteristics was submitted to the USI Board of Trustees at the September 4 meeting. The graphs show a relatively stable enrollment from Vanderburgh, Posey, Gibson, and Warrick counties (those immediately surrounding the University) and a substantial increase -- about 12 percent -- in enrollment from the other seven counties which make up Region 13 in southern Indiana. Part of the overall increase is attributed to improved student retention while increases in education and social science majors apparently stem from reports that more teachers will be needed in the near future and from USI's Bachelor of Social Work degree program, which is new this fall.

Dr. David Rice, USI president, said the fall enrollment demonstrates that the University is achieving its goals of improving the college participation rate in southern Indiana and making public higher education more accessible to residents of that region and the state. **Dr. John Pruis**, a board member who formerly was president of Ball State University, said the figures "tell me people are aware we are a separate state institution, they are hearing that this is a good place to go to school."

TERMINATION OF CYBER SERVICE. **Mr. Michael Curtis**, director of Computer Services, reports the time has come to pull the plug on the Cyber computer. The equipment allowing USI to connect to the Cyber at ISU will be removed at the end of September, when the agreement will be terminated. Mr. Curtis said that, due to a sudden change in circumstance, USI is being required to reload and recreate all University historical archive tapes from Terre Haute. They are rewritten at ISU, then loaded and copied on USI's IBM equipment. Mr. Curtis said it will be difficult to finish this work and keep up with normal processes at USI. He urges any person or office that has any remaining processes or data on the Cyber and has not been in

contact with the Computer Center regarding the termination to take immediate action. Contact **Ms. Karin Naab**, department coordinator and manager of computer operations, at extension 1899 for information.

IBEA is the professional voice for business education in Indiana and represents business educators at local, regional, state, and national levels.

The USI Board of Trustees has approved leave-of-absence and early-retirement status for **Dr. Dona Frost** and **Dr. Wanda B. Hibbitts**, both professors of business who expect to retire from USI at the end of the 1986-87 academic year. Each will be completing 17 years with the USI faculty.

Dr. John Gottcent, USI professor of English, has had a new book, The Bible: A Literary Study, published in September by Twayne Publishers of Boston. It is being included in a series Twayne is publishing as a masterworks of world literature to provide an introduction to literature for undergraduate students. Dr. Gottcent said he has not decided yet whether he will use his book at USI, although he will be teaching a class on the Bible as literature next spring.

HUMANITIES FORUMS. The first Humanities Forum program of the 1986-87 academic year will feature poetry and fiction readings by **Ms. Angela Jackson** of Chicago, a free-lance poetess and author. The program will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday, September 16, in UC 352-353.

In 1986, she was guest editor for a special Open Places issue devoted to "First World American Writers."

Mr. Bob Edwards, host of the "Morning Edition" news program on public radio -- aired locally on FM 88 -- will be featured in a Humanities Forum at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, September 25 in UC 350. The public is invited to hear Mr. Edwards discuss his job and journalism generally; there will be a question-answer session in which the audience and members of the local chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists - Sigma Delta Chi will participate. A reception will follow in the University Dining Room. Mr. Edwards also will speak at 11 a.m. Thursday in Forum I, with all USI students, faculty, and staff invited to attend.

Mr. Edwards' Evansville visit is being sponsored by FM 88. He will be at the station for a live interview starting at 7:20 a.m. Friday, September 26. The program will include an opportunity for call-in questions from the public. He also will be featured in an interview taped for WNIN-Channel 9 to be aired later.

Mr. Edwards has been host of the award winning "Morning Edition" since its first broadcast in 1979. He previously was host for public radio's "All Things Considered," a nightly news magazine program on which he also won two of broadcast journalism's most prestigious awards. He has written and produced several documentaries for public radio. A native of Louisville, Mr. Edwards received his bachelor's degree at the University of Louisville and began his broadcast career at a small station in nearby New Albany. Drafted in 1969, he produced Army radio documentaries and was a Korean correspondent for the American Forces Radio and Television Service. After his discharge, he earned a master's degree in broadcast journalism at The American University in Washington, D.C. He is a member of various professional organizations, serves on the Board of Visitors for the University of Alabama's School of Communications, and was editor-in-residence at Emory and Henry College in Virginia in 1984.

USI ARTISTS FEATURED AT MUSEUM. **Mr. John McNaughton**, USI professor of art, and seven of his present and past students are featured in "The Wood Connection," an exhibition of wood sculpture and other works which opened Tuesday, September 9 and will continue through October 5 at the Evansville

Museum of Arts and Science. The exhibition showcases 15 years of teaching and production for Mr. Naughton at USI. Also included in the exhibition are works by **Mr. Bob Brant, Ms. Nancy Burch, Mr. Kevin Irvin, Mr. Don Ledbetter, Ms. Amy Musia, Mr. William Pressler, and Mr. Curt Uebelhor**. Each has studied under Mr. McNaughton, with their careers ranging in status from undergraduate through graduate studies to being established in the art and business community.

WRITER SEMINAR UNDER WAY. A "Seminar on the Writer at Work" is being offered in the fall English 491 course, with the weekly classes featuring a variety of local writing talent. **Dr. Walter Everett**, associate professor of English who is instructor for the course, said the writers will discuss their work and the challenge of earning one's livelihood by writing. TAX REFORM WORKSHOP. Two certified public accountants from the Kemper CPA group will present an overview of the Tax Reform Act of 1986 in an evening workshop Tuesday, September 23. A registration fee of only \$5 has been established to allow maximum participation in a program designed to help the taxpayer understand the most comprehensive tax-law change in decades, one expected to affect every taxpayer. Applicants must have recommendations from two educators and an ability in a foreign language.

STATE TRAVEL POLICY. The State of Indiana has adopted a policy regarding travel compensation, premiums, and bonuses which includes the travel of USI employees. The policy states:

- I. It is the policy of the State of Indiana that any premium, bonus, or compensation acquired by any individual as a result of travel reimbursed by the University is the property of the University. This includes but is not limited to bonuses, premiums, and compensation for the following:
 - (A) Airline travel
 - (B) Other common carrier
 - (C) Hotel or motel
 - (D) Rental cars.
- II. Any individual who earns any compensation, premium, or bonus while the person is traveling for the University shall turn in the compensation, premium, or bonus to the Business Office. The Business Office shall issue a receipt to the employee and credit for the compensation, premium, or bonus will be made to the travel budget paying for the travel.
- III. The provisions of this policy are effective for any travel compensation, bonuses, or premiums earned after September 1, 1986.

CITY DIRECTORY INFORMATION. The Personnel Office now is preparing employee information to be used in the City Directory. USI employees who do not wish to be listed in the directory should advise the Personnel Office in a signed memo by Friday, September 26.

HEALTH INSURANCE INFORMATION. September is open enrollment month for obtaining group health insurance through either Blue Cross/Blue Shield or Maxicare Health Maintenance Organization. If you are not participating in either plan, if you need to add eligible dependents, or if you are interested in changing your type of coverage, stop by the Personnel Office, FWA 29, for enrollment and rate information.

Open enrollment will be the only opportunity during the 1986-87 contract year to enroll in one of the University-sponsored plans or to transfer your membership to a different plan. Staff members who wish to take advantage of the open enrollment period should contact the Personnel Office, extension 1770. Completion of enrollment papers and arrangements for payroll deduction for October 1, 1986 coverage should be made by September 16. After that date, cash payments will be accepted until the end of September for October 1, 1986 coverage.

TELEPHONE POLICY REMINDER. Use of University telephone numbers as third-party billing numbers for long-distance toll charges no longer is authorized by the University and will be denied by the telephone company upon attempted use. Collect calling and credit-card calling are not affected by the policy. Charges for any calls made from a personal phone for University business will be reimbursed upon presentation of the phone bill to the University Business Office, after approval by the appropriate fiscal officers.
