EVANSVILLE PHILHARMONIC ORCHESTRA PRESENTATION - "WAR REQUIEM"

More than 200 musicians and vocalists will take part in the Evansville Philharmonic Orchestra's massive presentation of Benjamin Britten's "War Requiem" 8:00 p.m. Saturday, March 23 at Vanderburgh Auditorium, with Minas Christian conducting.

In addition to the 80 Philharmonic musicians, the Evansville Choral Society made up of some 80 voices and a children's chorus made up of approximately 70 members will also take part.

Composer Britten, a confirmed pacifist and conscientious objector, combines the traditional Latin texts from the Mass for the Dead with the poetry of Wilfred Owen, World War I soldier killed in action.

FOREIGN STUDENT INTERVIEWS

Co T. Vu and Diep T. Vu, ISUE students from Saigon, Vietnam, are brother and sister. Co, a senior majoring in Management, transferred to ISUE last summer from Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, Illinois. Preferring a smaller school atmosphere, he likes ISUE and is especially pleased with Evansville, feeling it is a friendly town with less prejudice than he has encountered elsewhere. After graduation, Co plans to go on into graduate studies and then hopes to return to Vietnam. He has no definite plans for a career at this time, but intends to help his country in any way he can.

Co's sister, Diep, came to ISUE in January as a freshman. She, too, likes Evansville but being new to the United States, still has much trouble understanding many of us. We speak too fast. Diep hopes to obtain a bachelor's degree in Finance so she can return to Vietnam and help in their father's woolen clothing factory. Diep frankly admits to being a little homesick for the rest of their family. Although her boyfriend from home is also a student in the United States, Tennessee is several hours away.

When asked how he compares the American girls to the Vietnamese girls, Co smiled and said that the American girls seem to be much louder, more direct and open than the quiet and very reserved Vietnamese girls. However, he quickly went on to add that if he ever decided to marry an American girl, he would prefer her being open and direct because that's the way she is and was brought up. 
President David Rice will introduce the trio and the awards will be presented by the M.C., Kathy Will, Assistant to the President.
