PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. Dr. Barbara J. Marting, professor of business, has been named 1983 Woman of the Year by the local chapter of the American Business Women's Association. Annually, by electing a member Woman of the Year, chapters of the American Business Women's Association emphasize the unique contributions women make to the business world.

Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, is a scholar-in-residence at the Harvard University project for Kibbutz Studies during his sabbatical leave this semester. On April 12, he is to give the Colston Lecture at the Colston Symposium on Utopias at the University of Bristol, England. His address, which is to be published in the symposium proceedings, is "Lessons from American Religious Communal Societies from the Shakers to Jonestown." Dr. Pitzer is then to visit Greece, Egypt and Israel where he will be a research scholar at the Center for the Study of the Kibbutz and the Cooperative Idea at the University of Haifa and at the Yad Tabenkin Institute in Tel Aviv.

Dr. Darrel Bigham, professor of history, recently delivered a paper entitled "German Americans in Southwestern Indiana," at the Indiana State Museum in Indianapolis. The program was the first of a year-long series, Ethnic Groups in Indiana, sponsored by the Education Department of the Museum. Dr. Bigham was recently elected president of the Volunteer Action Center; re-elected president of Democrats for Better Government; and named chairman of the Metropolitan Evansville Progress Committee.
