## DE VRIES TO HEAD N.D. STATE COLLEGE

*Ted DeVries*, Chairman, Education Division and Professor of Education since 1969, has accepted the position of President of Valley City State College in Valley City, North Dakota.

*Dr. DeVries* initiated and helped develop the teacher education program at ISUE, working closely with area school corporations and initiating a program aimed at exposing ISUE students to real-life teaching situations by placing them in local classrooms as freshmen.

The college he will head is primarily a liberal arts and teacher training school and is one of five state colleges in North Dakota. *Dr. DeVries* will assume the responsibilities of his new position on August 28.

## LOCAL PERSONALITIES TO DEBATE ON CAMPUS

Two local personalities, *George Schenetzke*, of the Chamber of Commerce, and *Fred Stocker*, of the United Taxpayer Association, will debate the Vandi-gov issue in an American National Government class at ISUE on August 9 at 8:00 a.m.

## FOOD SERVICE AT THE UNIVERSITY

The food service for ISUE will be managed by *Saga Food Service*, the largest college food service company in the world. *Saga* will operate the snack bar, cafeteria and catered events on the campus.

The snack bar will be open for breakfast, lunch, and dinner beginning at 7:00 a.m. until 10:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The cafeteria will be open from 11:00 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

*Ronald Hultman* will be the food services director on campus. A graduate of Oral Roberts University, *Ron* has had five years of restaurant experience. The food service personnel hope to test the kitchen equipment and be ready for business on August 26, 1974.

## BASKETBALL PLANS SHAPING UP

Relying on the principle that winning is contagious, *Coach Wayne Boultinghouse* has announced the signing of 6'6-1/2" Eric Taylor of Christian County High School near Hopkinsville, Kentucky. Eric was a big reason Christian County had a 22-7 record last season and advanced into the regional finals of the Kentucky State Tournament. Earlier, standout guard Mike Torain of the same school was signed by the Eagles' new head coach. Other signees include 6'4-1/2" "Spider" Rowser of Monroe, Michigan, and 6'6" Mark Osterman of Mater Dei.

The Eagles are hopefully planning to play their December homecoming game in the renovated Central Gym. Central Gym is being put into shape and covered with coats of paint in readiness for the coming basketball season. As soon as his offices are completed, *Coach Boultinghouse* will move his office and staff into their renovated complex.

## CHILD CARE CENTER TO OPEN AT ISUE

Indiana State University Evansville plans to open a Children's Center this fall. The Children's Center will operate two separate programs for the convenience of ISUE students who have pre-school aged children. Faculty and staff may also use these services, if the center is not filled to capacity by students' children. The two programs are the ISUE Pre-School and the ISUE Day Care Center.

The Pre-School program is designed for children aged three to six who are toilet trained. Hours will be from 9:00 a.m. to noon each Monday, Wednesday, and Friday during the University academic year from August through May. Tuition for the pre-school program will be \$20.00 per month. The child's Insurance Policy is included in the tuition rate. The Pre-School program will be directed by Mrs. Katherine McNaughton and Mrs. Vinetta Scavone, both of whom will be on hand at all times. Both women have had extensive background in pre-school and primary grade education.

The other arm of the Children's Center, the Day Care Center, will accept children aged three to six providing they are toilet trained. The fee will be 50¢ per hour. The Day Care Center will be open from 8:45 a.m. to 2:15 p.m., five days a week. The child may be enrolled full time or on an hourly basis, depending on the parent's class schedule. The Day Care Center will operate August through May. It will be closed during holiday vacations and campus recesses.

The Day-Care Center will be directed by Jean Engelke. Mrs. Engelke has a liberal arts degree with a major in speech therapy from the University of Wisconsin, Madison. She has worked as a social worker in child welfare for four years and as a speech therapist for one year.

The Children's Center will be located in classrooms near the University Center, in what was the temporary classrooms last year. The fenced-in outdoor activities area overlooks Reflection Lake and Bent Twig Outdoor Learning Environment.
