5. An Experiment in Black Studies

IHETS are presenting a series of programs on Wednesday afternoons in Lecture Hall 126. The next programs scheduled will be:

March 18 -"Black Poetry". A program presented by Mari Evans, Poet-in-residence. On April 21, Miss Evans will make a personal appearance at ISUE, during the Ohio River Arts Festival. She will present a lecture at 11:00 a. m. in Room 126, and at 8:15 p. m. on that evening she will give a Poetry Reading of her own writings and other black poets. Her work as a poet has been used on record albums, several television specials, two off-Broadway productions and around 30 textbooks and anthologies, including Italian, German, Swedish, British, French and Dutch works. There will be no admission fee on April 21 to hear Miss Evans.

6. ISUE Open House

Sunday, March 15, the University sponsored an Open House on the Campus, from 2:00 to 5:00 p. m. Tours were conducted through the offices, classrooms, and lounges.
