RAVE REVIEWS FOR ISUE THEATRE. "The Prisoner of Second Avenue, ISUE Theatre's season opener, received rave reviews from local critics last weekend. "ISUE Theatre triumphs this time around, staging the best of three Neil Simon shows now playing in the Evansville area," stated Patrice Smith of the Evansville Courier. "The cast of ISUE Theatre's production of 'Prisoner' on opening night was brilliant, adeptly balancing the playwright's combination of hilarity and angst", declared Bill Crowe of the Evansville Press. Crowe also reported that this is the strongest of the three plays now being staged in the area.

"Prisoner" continues Friday and Saturday, September 30 and October 1, at ISUE Theatre at Igleheart and Barker Avenues. Performances will begin at 8:00 p.m. each night. Ticket prices are \$4.00 for general admission and \$30.00 for ISUE students and senior citizens. For ticket reservations, call the Division of Humanities at 464-1734.

GROWING UP IN EVANSVILLE. Dr. Darrel Bigham, professor of history, has interviewed natives of a number of Evansville neighborhoods--Riverside, Howell, Baptistown, Goosetown, St. Anthony, and Fourth Street, among others--and has blended their histories into a 45-minute slide/ tape presentation. Growing up in Evansville is a free program funded in part by the Indiana Committee for the Humanities.

The presentation has been scheduled at the following times and locations: Sunday, October 16, Indiana State University Evansville, 2:00 p.m.; Tuesday, October 18, Daniel Wertz PTA, 7:00 p.m.; Wednesday, October 19, C. Discussion will follow each program and participants will learn how a neighborhood's economic and social structure has been influenced by its history.

BLUE CROSS/BLUE SHIELD INFORMATION. October is open enrollment month for Blue Cross/Blue Shield health insurance. This enrollment period is made available to all employees who have not previously enrolled themselves or their dependents in the group health insurance program. FROM THE CREDIT UNION. On Wednesday, October 5, 1983, Loeva Piepenbrink, manager of the ISU Federal Credit Union, will be on campus to talk with the faculty and staff about services and accounts available through the Credit Union. Ms. Piepenbrink will make a presentation at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. in the Library, Room L100, to interested employees. One of the main topics to be addressed is the availability of share drafts. Share draft accounts, which are similar to checking accounts, will be available at no charge to ISUE members who have payroll deductions into their share draft accounts. Retired members who have their share draft accounts also will have free share drafts. With share drafts there is no minimum balance required and there are no monthly charges. Members with share draft accounts will receive carbonless copy checks, overdraft advance from shares (maximum of three per month), and monthly statements.
