NEW HARMONY GALLERY OF CONTEMPORARY ART. "Architectural Inspirations," works by five Midwest artists, will be exhibited in June at New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, beginning with a free public reception for the artists from 1 to 4 p.m. Sunday, June 5. The exhibition will continue through June 30. Featured artists will be Mr. Mark Fowler of Champaign, Illinois, known in the area for his faceted, blown-glass sculptures; Mr. Dean Denton of St. Louis, a photographer who has been a frequent New Harmony visitor; Ms. Laura Griffith of St. Louis, an architectural model builder and sculptor; Mr. Richard Nickolson, associate professor at Herron School of Art who will present oil on shaped canvas paintings; and Mr. Ron Kovatch of the Chicago Art Institute, whose architectural shapes are carved and painted on ceramic vessel forms.

SUMMER HISTORY INSTITUTE. Wednesday, June 1, is the deadline to register for a Summer History Institute being presented by the USI Office of Continuing Education in cooperation with the Historic Southern Indiana Project. The institute will be held July 11-15 at USI, with trips to the various sites cooperating in the HSI Project. The \$125 registration fee will include course materials; travel to the sites; admission fees; "Young Abe Lincoln" outdoor drama; and meals and overnight accommodations Thursday and Friday at Kordes Enrichment Center in Ferdinand (double occupancy; for single, add \$5).
