Child-Abuse Workshop: The Federal Law Enforcement Training Center, in conjunction with the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, will present the first of three spring workshops for police officers, prosecutors, and social workers who work with child-abuse cases in 22 southern Indiana counties. The workshop will be held at the Holiday Inn, Evansville, co-sponsored by USI and the Child Advocacy Center, Inc., and is funded in part by a grant obtained from the W. R. Kellogg Foundation by Melissa Vandeveer, USI assistant professor of nursing and director of the Kellogg Foundation Community Project Grant.

Robert H. Farley, deputy U.S. marshal assigned to the Federal Child Exploitation Strike Force, will conduct the workshop. It will address recognition of child neglect and physical abuse, providing participants with techniques to identify and investigate cases of soft tissue injury, including burns, welts, bruises, and lacerations,

as well as factures and visceral trauma. Farley has had more than 14 years of experience with the Cook County (Chicago) Sheriff's Department, investigating crimes against children.
