

# COLUMBIAN EXHIBIT

"Maps and the Columbian Encounter," an 80-foot serpentine exhibit of 43 maps and 150 images dealing with the 500th anniversary of Columbus's voyage to the new world, will open Saturday, December 12, in the Administration Building corridor.

WILL OPEN AT USI

The exhibit was organized by the Office of Map History at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and was brought to Indiana by the Indiana Humanities Council. Assisting with the exhibit at USI are **Dr. Robert** L. Reid, vice president for Academic Affairs and professor of history; the Historic Southern Indiana Project; and the School of Education and Human Services.

The exhibit will be on view from 1 to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, December 12-13, then during the University's regular hours until after the holidays when a new public schedule will be announced. The exhibit will continue through February 15.
