



CHAMPIONSHIP FIDDLER AT HUMANITIES FORUM.

Mrs. Lena Hughes of Ludlow, Kentucky, billed as a championship fiddler and Queen of the Guitar Pickers, will perform at the ISUE Humanities Forum held Wednesday, October 4 at 12:00 noon in the Administration Building, Room 28.

Coming from a musical family, Hughes started performing in public with her father at the age of nine and has continued to play a "flat top" old time guitar without any electrical appliances

for over 50 years. In 1956, she played her first notes on a fiddle and has been competing and winning fiddling contests ever since. Her latest triumphs include being the first woman to win the Sam McCrackin Memorial Trophy, and winning the senior division championship at the national convention of the Old Time Fiddlers Association. She and her husband Jake, a master of the banjo, were sponsored by the Smithsonian to play at a folk music event in Montreal, Canada, in 1971, to perform and run a clinic at the University of Nebraska, and to play at Washington University in St. Louis. For 34 years they spent three months of each year living in a camper while attending and playing at fiddling and folk music events. The other nine months, they usually farmed in northern Carroll County, Kentucky.

The Humanities Forums are free and open to the public.
