Mr. Charles McDowell, Washington columnist for the Richmond, Virginia, Times-Dispatch, syndicated columnist with Scripps-Howard News Service, and frequent panelist on the PBS program, Washington Week in Review, will speak at the 8 p.m. gala in Robert E. Green Convention Center.

Mr. William Burleigh, executive vice-president for Newspapers/Publishing with Scripps-Howard, which owns *The Evansville Courier*, calls Mr. McDowell "funny and profound... wonderfully warm and under-

standing. His intellectual, sure-fired, entertaining style will remind you of folk hero Will Rogers."

Washington Week in Review is carried by Channel 9 in Evansville. Reflecting on the long-term success of the program, Mr. McDowell says, "Viewers will forgive anything if you'll just be straight with them, and this program makes it easy to do that. Maybe it has something to do with being there with colleagues you respect; you're not inclined to be pretentious or fancy. It's being comfortable with who you are and what you know -- and not a lick more."

Invitations have been mailed for USI's gala 25th Anniversary celebration Saturday, September 15, for a dinner and keynote speaker, Mr. Charles McDowell, Washington political columnist and public television commentator. Employees who wish to attend have the option of purchasing two tickets at a reduced price of \$25 each. The regular price of \$50 per ticket includes a \$25 donation to the Presidential Scholarship program. It is hoped that as many employees as possible will attend the celebration.

Mr. McDowell also will attend a noon luncheon September 15 for USI student leaders and faculty department chairs, and will be a featured guest on the *Vandeveer Report* on Channel 9.

The gala will culminate a week of special anniversary activities at USI, including the return of several graduates to discuss their career successes with current students.

Mr. McDowell is a Danville, Kentucky, native who has been with the Richmond newspaper since 1949 and

its Washington columnist since 1965 -- the year USI was founded in Centennial School as a branch campus of Indiana State University. That same year, Mr. McDowell's Campaign Fever, a journal of the 1964 presidential campaign, was published. He has covered every national political convention since 1952 and was a National Public Radio commentator during both 1984 conventions. The Miller Center of Public Affairs at the University of Virginia presented Mr. McDowell an award in 1984 recognizing "an enduring contribution to the understanding of the American presidency."

Mr. McDowell is a graduate of Washington & Lee University and Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism. He is the author of two additional books, which are collections of his columns, and numerous magazine articles.

GATEWAY OFFERS YOUTH, ADULTS CHANCE FOR COLLEGE EDUCATION

These are some student assessments of the year-old Gateway Center program being offered in Evansville's center city by USI, taking the University programs to students who for a variety of reasons would not otherwise have considered college classes.

The Gateway goal is to provide an easily accessible and comfortable environment in which minority and economically disadvantaged adults can take their first steps toward higher education and more productive employment.

Gateway is located in the former St. John School building at 625 Bellemeade, in walking distance for many students. It also is on the city bus line and Gateway staff will aid students in finding transportation, if needed, and with finding convenient child-care programs — two major items that could keep them from venturing into a college setting.

Another problem, of course, is financial. Students are assisted in finding adequate financial support for their studies, with many qualifying for 100 percent tuition through Pell Grant or other assistance programs.

Ms. Kandace Hinton, Gateway director, said while the participation was limited the first year, enrollment for the second probably will double, for many reasons. "A student will bring a friend in and sit with them while we discuss what Gateway can offer them. Neighbors stop by to discuss the program and may enroll in a course. Churches in the area are relaying the message that Gateway Center can help," Ms. Hinton said.

One of the better recruiters has been a Gateway neighbor, the Evansville Black Coalition. The agency handles job-skill and job-search activities for its clients, and has referred about 10 people to Gateway, half of whom remain in the program.

Ms. Hinton said one of the first was Ms. Hannah Howell, a Gateway success story, the kind of person who is the reason for Gateway's existence. Ms. Howell is a single mother of four who has held part-time jobs in the past. She had obtained a general

education diploma (high school GED) and was in search of another part-time job when she visited the Black Coalition office a year ago and was referred to Gateway.

Ms. Howell and Gateway meshed -- she entered developmental courses last fall and by spring, was embarking on freshman-level college courses en route to earning a degree in nursing. And, said Ms. Hinton, she is doing it with a 4.0 grade point average.

Ms. Hinton said Gateway's first-year assessment -- 63 percent of the students have completed several courses; 76 percent have moved from developmental courses into regular college courses; 84 percent of the latter are in good academic standing -- doesn't tell the story the staff sees among the students. The increased motivation and self-worth are evident. she said, among people who were "on the road to nowhere" and now want to learn. They are not deterred by failing to get an "A" or "B" or even by failing a test -- they are motivated enough to repeat the class. "We see a general trend -- they want to learn," Ms. Hinton said.

Gateway will begin its fall semester on Monday, August 27. Registration and orientation will be held Thursday and Friday, August 23-24, at the center. Anyone interested in the program is invited to drop by and talk with the Gateway staff or call 424-2926.

INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS OPPOR-**TUNITIES.** "Investment Opportunities in China, Korea, and the Far East" will be the topic of a seminar Thursday, August 30, opening a fall program at USI on International Business Opportunity. The seminar, designed to introduce participants to the advantages and precautions of doing business in the Far East, will be held at 1 p.m. in the University Conference Center. It is cosponsored by the Metropolitan Evansville Chamber of Commerce, Tri-State World Trade Council, and the USI Office of Continuing Education. Subsequent seminars will cover business with Poland and Eastern Europe, October 11, and international business basics, November 26.

The featured speakers in August will be Dr. Armin Bohnet, an expert in public finance and theory of economic orders, with a specialty in strategies for economic reform in socialist countries, particularly China and East Germany, and Dr. Sang T. Choe, USI associate professor of marketing who has been certified since 1970 as a foreign trade specialist by the Republic of Korea Ministry of Commerce and Industry. Dr. Bohnet has been a professor of economics at Justus-Liebig University GieBen since 1973 and is auditor of the International Institute of Public Finance. He has written many articles on China's economy and public policy. Dr. Choe's numerous publications include articles on models for export/import proce-
