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USI announces appointment of new dean

The associate dean of the College of Liberal Arts at Texas State University-San Marcos is set to assume the top leadership post in University of Southern Indiana's School of Liberal Arts.

Dr. David Glassman's appointment as dean of the USI School of Liberal Arts will be effective July 1.

"We are delighted that Dr. Glassman will be coming onboard as the new Liberal Arts Dean," said Dr. Linda Bennett, provost and vice president for Academic Affairs. "He has an outstanding record as a teacher-scholar and solid administrative experience. I look forward to working with him."

Glassman, 50, has served as associate dean of the College of Liberal Arts at Texas State University-San Marcos since 2003. Texas State has an enrollment of more than 26,000 students, and more than 3,700 of them major in liberal arts. Roughly 48 percent of the credit hours earned at USI, where enrollment is nearly 10,000, are through the University's School of Liberal Arts.

A professor of anthropology at Texas State since 1992, lassman has served as chair of the university's Department of Anthropology since 1997. Under his leadership, the department completed three major strategic initiatives by establishing a Master of Arts program with a major in anthropology, the Center for Art and Symbolism in Ancient America, and the Center for Archaeological Studies.

He also developed and implemented strategies for student retention, increasing the diversity of students and faculty, and defining student-learning outcomes.

"I think my best qualifications have to do with my experience in helping academic organizations move to the next level through shared governance and cooperation," Glassman said.

"I think my style of dealing with tough situations in a fair and equitable manner has had great success in the past, and lastly, I'd probably say my enthusiasm for education, particularly the liberal arts, is a driving force behind my vision and my leadership."

The Minnesota native holds three degrees in anthropology: a Ph.D. and M.A. from University of Tennessee-Knoxville and a B.A. from University of Minnesota-Minneapolis. He also has certification as a diplomate of the American Board of Forensic Anthropology.

Forensic anthropology, bioarchaeology, primate studies, skeletal biology, and human growth are among his major fields of interest.

An award-winning teacher, Glassman also has made numerous presentations at professional meetings and as invited lectures. His work has been published in many academic journals, and he

a reviewer for the American Journal of Physical Anthropology, American Journal of Primatology, and Human Biology, among other publications.

Glassman, who has one son, resides in San Marcos and anticipates relocating to the Evansville area in June.

"What really sold me on USI is the collegiality of the faculty

and administration, and also the strong promise that seems to be there," he said.

A USI Search Committee began reviewing candidates for the position of dean of the School of Liberal Arts in November. Dr. Iain Crawford, former dean, left the University after accepting a position at College of Wooster. Dr. Tom Wilhelmus, USI professor of English, is serving as acting dean in the interim.

Exhibit highlighting Bigham's work

A USI professor's work is the basis for the Black History Month exhibit at the Evansville Museum of Arts, History, and Science.

Research and images from Dr. Darrel Bigham's 1987 book, We Ask Only for a Fair Trial: A History of the Black Community of Evansville, Indiana, are the foundation of the exhibit that opened January 25. Bigham, a professor of history, also is director of the Historic Southern Indiana Project at USI.

The "We Ask Only for a Fair Trial" exhibit examines the development of the African American community in Evansville, primarily from 1812 to 1945. It chronicles the arrival of African Americans in the city, the growth of the African American population following the Civil War, and subsequent population decline until World War I.

The University community is invited to attend a free opening reception for the exhibit from 6 to 8 p.m. Saturday, January 31, when Bigham will be available to discuss his book and the exhibition. Reservations are requested, 812/425-2406.

The museum also will host a "Meet the Author" session at 7 p.m. Thursday, February 5, when Dr. Robert Mays, associate dean of USI's Bower-Suhrheinrich School of Education and Human Services, will conduct an informal interview with Bigham, recipient of the state Historical Society's Hoosier Historian Award.

In addition to discussing his work creating the book, Bigham will explore what needs to be done to enhance what is known about Evansville, and especially its African American community since 1950. Audience participation is welcome at the free event.

The author's other published works include Images of America: Evansville; Towns and Villages of the Lower Ohio; and Reflections on a Heritage: The German Americans in Southwestern Indiana. He cowrote Images of America: New Harmony, Indiana, and his On Jordan's Banks: The Aftermath of Emancipation on the Lower Ohio River is forthcoming from University Press of Kentucky.

Bigham joined the USI faculty in 1970. He holds a B.A. from Messiah College, was a Rockefeller Fellow at Harvard Divinity School, and earned a Ph.D. at University of Kansas.

Scholar to discuss post-9/11 world

An author, international affairs scholar, and expert in policy analysis and international operations will speak on campus February 12.

James P. Muldoon Jr., senior fellow with the Center for Global Change and Governance of Rutgers University-Newark, will present "Order and Governance in the Age of Terrorism – The Role of International Organizations in the Post-9/11 World" at 7 p.m. in Kleymeyer Hall in the Liberal Arts Center.

In addition to lecturing widely on the United Nations, diplomacy, and international affairs in the United States, Europe, and Asia, Muldoon has published the book, *The Architecture of Global Governance: An Introduction to the Study of International Organizations*, and the essay collection, *Multilateral Diplomacy and the United Nations Today*.

He also is editing a new book, Confronting International Terrorism: The View from China, which is forthcoming from Lynne Rienner Publishers. He is co-editor of Multilateral Diplomacy and the United Nations Today and has contributed to numerous major newspapers and academic journals.

In his role as senior fellow, Muldoon conducts research on international diplomacy and international organizations. He previously served as a senior research fellow at the Carnegie Council on Ethics and International Affairs, visiting scholar at the Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences in China, and director of Education Programs with the United Nations Association of the United States of America.

A resident of Lake Forest, Ill., he holds an M.A. in political science from Miami University-Ohio and a B.A. from St. Louis University. Muldoon's free presentation will be followed by a question-and-answer period and book signing.

A University donor, community volunteer, and longtime teacher, **Ruth Gray Yates**, 95, Tell City, Ind., died January 26.

In recognition of her interest in USI, dedication to community involvement, and commitment to education, the University planned to award Yates an honorary Doctor of Laws degree during the 2004 Commencement ceremony. Upon approval by the USI Board of Trustees, the degree will be conferred posthumously.

A member of Reflections, USI Foundation's planned giving society, she was an annual underwriter of The New Harmony Theatre and had established the Ruth Gray Yates Endowed Presidential Scholarship as well as a four-year named Presidential Scholarship. She also established an endowed scholarship for high school seniors in Tell City and an endowed scholarship at Eden Theological Seminary in St. Louis.

A University of Evansville graduate, she began a 35-year teaching career in the Vanderburgh County School System in 1928. A dedicated volunteer, she worked with numerous local, state, and national groups, and in 1997 she received the Indiana Retired Seniors Volunteer Program Volunteer of the Year Award. In 2003, the hospital auxiliaries of southwestern Indiana named her Auxilian of the Year.

She is survived by a sister-in-law, Ann Campbell Gray of Florida, and was preceded in death by her husband Davis Yates in 1981.
