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JUDY CLABES TO KEYNOTE WOMEN'S HISTORY CELEBRATION. Judith Clabes, former editor of The Sunday Courier and Press and now editor of The Kentucky Post, will be the keynote speaker for the Women's History Celebration on campus Saturday, March 10. Ms. Clabes will discuss her new book, "New Guardians of the Press, Selected Profiles of America's Women Newspaper Editors." An autograph party will precede the luncheon at 11:30 a.m. in the University Center.

In the newly-published book edited by Ms. Clabes, thirteen women editors share their experiences and their expectations. About the book, Ms. Clabes says, "This is a book about opportunity and about women. In choosing women to tell their stories in my book, I considered the roster of American Society of Newspaper Editors and the pages of Editor and Publisher Yearbook. I wanted women who were really in charge of newsrooms. What I ended up with were women willing to share a part of themselves with others who care about the state of the art and the status of the artists. Together we hope to provide living proof that there is no formula for success, no pattern, no mold that any woman must fit in order to be fit for the top job."

The keynote address by Ms. Clabes will culminate a week of activities in celebration of women's contributions to society throughout history. TRI-STATE UNDERGRADUATE PSYCHOLOGY RESEARCH CONFERENCE. The third annual Tri-State Undergraduate Psychology Research Conference will be held at ISUE Saturday, April 14 in the University Center. The guest speaker will be Dr. Alan Carsrud of the University of Texas at Austin, department of management, who will speak on "Psychology in the Business World: Achievement, Motivation and Job Performance."

Dr. Carsrud is a licensed psychologist who regularly consults with businesses and conducts research on topics such as personnel selection, achievement, motivation, and marketing. He currently is engaged in a case study of the Braniff Airlines bankruptcy. In addition, he has studied the characteristics of successful women in business and is organizing a conference on the topic to be held at the University of Texas in April. While at ISUE, Dr. Carsrud will meet with psychology students to discuss topics such as graduate school admissions. He also will conduct a workshop on personnel selection in non-profit organizations, sponsored by the Office of Continuing Education.

Dr. Carsrud has a strong interest in undergraduate research. He founded one of the first undergraduate research conferences while a student at the University of New Hampshire. Since that time, he has written numerous articles about undergraduate research and participated in many symposia. One of his articles entitled "Good Research is Not Nested Under Ph.D.'s" is a frequently cited reference.

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The Tri-State UPRC exists to recognize and encourage research by undergraduate psychology students. Students have the opportunity to present their research in a format similar to the regional and national psychology conventions. Last year, a total of 27 papers were accepted for presentation at the Tri-State UPRC. Six of the papers represented research projects completed by ISUE students.
