22 GRANTS AWARDED. The Indiana Committee for the Humanities, an affiliate of the federally-funded National Endowment for the Humanities, has selected "Private Rights and the Public Interest: The Continuing American Revolution" as its program theme for 1975-76. Grant application deadlines have been established for June 15, August 15, October 15, and December 15 of this year. Last year the Indiana Committee for the Humanities awarded \$78,757 to 22 universities and community organizations throughout the state.

FREE IMMUNIZATION FOR EMPLOYEES, The ISUE Health Services wishes to announce a new service for employees. In cooperation with the Evansville Vanderburgh County Public Health Department, the Health Service located in AD 115 is offering free tetanus toxoid booster injections to ISUE employees. This is a preventative type program emphasizing Diphtheria and Tetanus immunizations. There are several stipulations to the program. The Health Service is only offering the booster injection, so the employee must have previously had the D.T. or D.P.T. Series. Those who are doubtful as to their history of tetanus injections are asked to check with their family doctor for immunization records. It is now a recommendation that you have a tetanus injection every 5-10 years. The Health Service is especially encouraging anyone who works with machinery, etc., often to please inquire about these injections. For further information or appointment, call Extension 258.
