MARLENE SANDERS ADDRESSES HUMANITIES FORUM ON
"WOMEN AND SOCIETY."

Marlene Sanders, Vice President of the American Broadcasting Company and Director of Documentaries, addressed faculty, staff, students and invited guests on "Women and Society" in the Humanities Forum on Monday, January 16. Ms. Sanders holds the highest position in broadcasting ever to be achieved by a woman, and is only the third woman Vice President at ABC, and the only woman Vice President in the news department.

Ms. Sanders' presentation was a short autobiographical sketch of her career, beginning in 1955 when she was a reporter for WNEW-TV in New York, and ending with the position she was most recently promoted to. Interjected in her talk were subtle appeals to women to rise to the challenges that the business world has to offer, and seek some of the opportunities that are opening up. "What we have now are rising expectations," comments Ms. Sanders. "The opportunities are beginning to be there."

At the end of her presentation, there was a brief question/answer period during which time Ms. Sanders was asked whether or not she would ever go back to anchoring a news program. Ms. Sanders quickly replied she would not, as her interests have changed, and she is now primarily concerned with changing and improving policy at ABC. Now holding a position with power, Ms. Sanders commented, "On the air and in executive positions, women want power...the hope of feminists is that women in power will change the meaning of power, and make the world a more humane and peaceful place in which to live."

When asked how she regarded the failure of the passage of the Equal Rights Amendment in New York and New Jersey, Ms. Sanders noted that "there was over-confidence in its passage in New York and New Jersey, but I feel it was only a temporary setback...There's a movement that won't be stopped by this."

In reference to her three week tour in Vietnam on a reporting assignment in April and May of 1966, Ms. Sanders was asked if assignment editors don't feel somewhat hesitant about sending women into war zones to get the news. In her response Ms. Sanders commented: "I don't think we're (women) any more or less brave than men. I knew men who were also there to report the news, and they were just as apprehensive as I was. But how could anyone not go? That's where the news was!"

In conclusion to her address on "Women and Society," Ms. Sanders echoed the appeal, in a very firm but calm and sophisticated manner, that has been made by women all over the world, not just for women, but for all minorities: "We want to do our very best in what we do; but we also want to be paid in full, and be given the freedom to go as high as we can."

WRITERS' CLINIC. A Writers' Clinic has been formed in the Learning Resources Center on the second floor of the Library to assist ISUE students on an individualized basis with any writing problems they may have. The Writers' Clinic is staffed by ten tutors taken from Dr. Ann Scott's Practicum: Tutoring and Individualized Instruction in English class. "Any ISUE student who feels a need to further develop his writing skills, or any instructor who notices a writing problem in one of his students, is encouraged to utilize the Writers' Clinic," comments Dr. Scott, Assistant Professor of English. AMERICAN ISSUES FORUM, Dr. David D. Martin, Professor of Business Economics and Public Policy, Indiana University School of Business, will speak at the American Issues Forum on February 18, 1976. This program, open to the public in Room A34 at 7:30 p.m., will be devoted to a discussion of the issues surrounding the growth of business enterprise and governmental regulation of business in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

Dr. Martin, former Chief Economist for the Anti-Trust and Monopoly Subcommittee of the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee from 1971 to 1974, has also been a consultant to the Department of Justice, the Council of Economic Advisers, the Federal Trade Commission and the Department of Commerce. He is considered one of the nation's foremost anti-trust law experts and has published numerous books and articles on the subject.

The American Issues Forum is being offered in conjunction with the Bicentennial activities at ISUE.
