

EXPERIENCING GEOMETRY. Dr. Alan Zollman, professor of mathematics at the University of Kentucky, will be the featured speaker when some 40 Tri-State elementary and secondary mathematics teachers gather Thursday and Friday, October 5-6, for a workshop designed to help them understand the use and teaching of geometry. Dr. Zollman's topic will be "The NCTM (National Council of Teachers of Mathematics) Standards and How They Relate to Geometry." Dr. Victoria M. Pohl, chairman of the USI Mathematics Department who obtained a \$9,000 Indiana Commission for Higher Education grant to fund the workshop, will conduct sessions for seventh- through twelfth-grade teachers; Mr. Kim Brown, an Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation supervisor, will conduct sessions for kindergarten to sixth-grade teachers. Handson activities for the two-day conference will include the use of Dr. Pohl's book, How to Enrich Geometry Using String Designs.
