HUMANITIES FORUM EVENTS SCHEDULED. Humanities Forum events are scheduled for Tuesday and Thursday, October 12 and 14. David Robichaux, an anthropologist and collector, will speak on "Pre-hispanic Antecedents to Modern Mexican Culture" on Tuesday, at noon, in UC352.

Mr. Robichaux, who received a post-graduate degree in anthropology at the Ibero-Americana in Mexico City, has lived in Mexico City for 16 years where he has worked as a translator and been teaching anthropology. Some of his art work will be displayed at the University Center that same day.

ISUE will host the premiere of the documentary film "Water From Another Time" on Thursday, October 14, at 7:30 p.m. in A126. The documentary was shot entirely in Southern Indiana and has received endorsements of the National Council on Aging and the American Association of Retired Persons.

The film was produced by former Indiana filmmaker Richard Kane and Bloomington folklorist Dillon Bustin. The documentary was sponsored by ISUE and financed by the Indiana Committee for the Humanities, the Indiana Arts Commission, and the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The premiere will include a live musical performance by Dillon Bustin and songwriter Lotus Dickey. Refreshments will be served following a question-answer period conducted by the filmmakers. The public is invited to attend all Humanities Forum events. Admission is free.

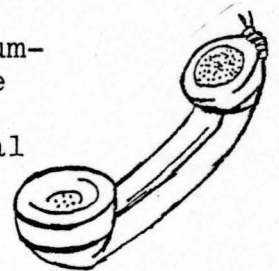
