According to Hubbell, American Buffalo deals with "real anguish and frustration--from the street milieu" and shows its characters attempting to cope, oftentimes by ineffectual means, with the boredom of existence. Hubbell further noted that to achieve the play's subtle, covert sense of violence, the three male players should convey a strong sense of ensemble, while maintaining diversity in their individual roles. In order to capture the necessary realism they must connect with Mamet's use of the American idiom: its variance, its color and cadence."

STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP AVAILABLE FOR "MY MOTHER, MYSELF" WORKSHOP. Forms are available at the Campus Ministry and Student Activities Office to apply for the \$25.00 student scholarship to attend the "My Mother, Myself" workshop, designed to explore how women's relationships with their mothers have helped form their personality.

"A lot of women come to this workshop thinking that they're not at all like their mothers," says Melissa Lawler, a psychotherapist who will conduct a weekend workshop at ISUE. "We try to help women focus on how their relationships with their mothers are affecting their lives now."

The workshop is based on Gestalt therapy which Lawler explains "focuses on developing an awareness of 'how' we live in our 'now', permitting the individual to take responsibility for his or her own actions." The workshop will help participants move away from a blaming stance toward understanding and awareness of their mothers' gifts and limitations and toward taking responsibility for who they are.

During the 14-hour program specific exercises will be used to augment participants' awareness of their relationship with their mother and how that relationship influences their attitudes and behavior today as women, as daughters, and as mothers themselves. For instance, participants are asked to draw six scenes from life (not all happy times) with their mother and title each drawing as though it were a chapter in a book. Participants then share their memories with each other.

"I do very little teaching," Lawler says. "We do a lot of sharing of personal feelings."

Lawler, president of Indianapolis Gestalt Institute, has a Master of Arts degree in psychology and 30 hours post graduate work. She has conducted numerous similar workshops.

The workshop will be held Saturday, March 1, and Sunday, March 2, from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The registration deadline is February 22, 1980. For further information, contact the Office of Continuing Education at extension 1863.
