Sponsored by the School of Business, Mr. Daniel S. Hermann '79, president of Black Beauty Coal Company, will present the spring Alumni-in-Residence lecture "Succeeding in a Declining Industry - Is it Luck?" The lecture will be held at 11 a.m. on Wednesday, March 3, in Carter Hall. The lecture is free and open to the public. Hermann will meet with business students, faculty, and administrators in other sessions throughout the day.

Hermann began his career in 1979 as a staff accountant for Harding Shymanski & Company. In 1982, he became accounting manager for Black Beauty Coal Company and was promoted to various positions including executive vice president. In December 1997, Hermann accepted the position of president and chief operating officer of Black Beauty Coal Company and Black Beauty Resources, Inc. Hermann also holds offices with affiliated companies including Gibco Motor Express, Inc.; Eagle Coal Company, LLC; Falcon Coal Company, LLC; United Minerals, LLC; Sugar Camp, LLC; and Arclar Company, LLC.

Faculty Research and Creative Work Award deadline and workshop

Monday, March 15 is the deadline for submission of proposals for the Faculty Research and Creative Work Awards, which fund full-time faculty members' creative work, applied research, and basic research. Proposals to initiate new research or creative work, continue research or work in progress, or complete a project are eligible for funding.

Submit the original plus eight copies of the proposal to the Office of Grants and Sponsored Research, WA 104-H, by 4:30 p.m. on Monday, March 15, (the first Monday following spring recess). The Faculty and Academic Affairs Committee will evaluate proposals; awards may fully or partially fund a request. The Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs will notify applicants of awards by April 26.

Please adhere to page limits specified in the guidelines; the committee will not review proposals that exceed the page limits.

Louis Zorich to direct and act at New Harmony Theatre

Academy Award-winning actress Olympia Dukakis, originally slated to direct this summer's New Harmony Theatre production of *The Cherry Orchard*, will be replaced by her husband Louis Zorich, currently portraying Burt Bachman on NBC-TV's "Mad About You." Dukakis has accepted an offer from the National Theatre in London to perform a one-woman show this spring and summer. She will be the first American actor to do such a project at the National Theatre.

"Of course we're disappointed that Olympia will not be in residence this summer, but this is such an honor for her," said **Mr. Scott LaFeber**, director of theatre. "When we start losing talent to arguably the greatest theatre in the English-speaking world, I think we're doing pretty well. And we're obviously very excited that Louis will be stepping in as director as well as acting in *The Cherry Orchard* this summer."

Zorich has appeared on Broadway with Laurence Olivier and Anthony Quinn in *Beckett*, with Dustin Hoffman in *Death of a Salesman*, and in *Hadrian VII* for which he received a Tony Award nomination. His other Broadway credits include *She Loves Me*, *The Odd Couple*, and *They Knew What They Wanted* which earned him a Drama Desk Award nomination. Zorich has appeared in over 100 television shows, most notably starring in "Brooklyn Bridge," "Young At Heart" with Frank Sinatra, and is a regular on NBC's "Mad About You" with Paul Reiser and Helen Hunt. His film credits include *Fiddler On The Roof*, *The Muppets Take Manhattan*, and *Dirty Rotten Scoundrels* with Michael Caine.

In addition to *The Cherry Orchard*, Cole Porter's 1938 musical, *You Never Know*, and the popular play *Steel Magnolias* will complete the summer at The New Harmony Theatre. Names in the news

Dr. Paul K. Doss, chair of the Geology and Physics Department, was featured speaker at the Evansville Audubon Society meeting held February 16. The topic "Wetlands and Water Quality" focused on the diversity of wetland types, with specific examples from Indiana, the Midwest, and elsewhere in the country. Dr. Doss summarized some of the major types and sources of water contamination, and discussed how natural and constructed wetlands are beneficial to human society for maintenance and improvement of water quality.

A paper co-written by **Dr. Norman King**, associate professor of geology, was published in the July-August issue of *Journal of Geology*. "Stratigraphic Model for Glacial-Eustatic Pennsylvanian Cycloths in Highstand Nearshore Detrital Regimes" appears in volume 106. In this paper, he and two colleagues present evidence for past sea-level fluctuations caused by waxing and waning of ancient glaciers. Their interpretation is that Pennsylvanian-age coal beds of the Illinois basin were deposited as sea level was rising, which flooded coastal areas. Coal was deposited in vast lowland swamps analogous to today's Great Dismal Swamp of Virginia and Okefenokee Swamp of Florida.

Dr. Robert L. Reid, vice president for Academic Affairs, attended the winter meeting of the Academic Affairs Resource Center of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) on January 30 in Tucson, Arizona. He led a workshop "Administrative Issues and How to Solve Them" for the Academic Leadership Institute and presented a paper "The Status of Part-timers at AASCU Institutions" to the general meeting of AASCU academic vice presidents.

During the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation's spring

break, a camp for children in kindergarten through age 10 will be held from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday, March 29 through Thursday, April 1 in L-100 of Rice Library. The camp will not meet Friday, April 2, due to the Good Friday holiday. Cost is \$65 for the week; the day rate is \$17. Enrollment is open to children of USI faculty, students, and staff.

Summer enrichment programs
