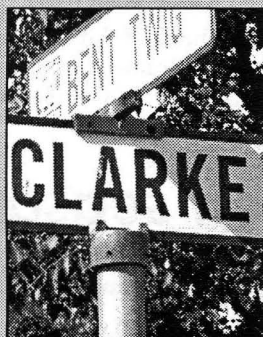

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Roadworthy: Revamped portions of Clarke, Bent Twig lanes to open soon

The new traffic pattern for vehicles turning right onto campus after leaving the overpass will include a one-way street starting at Clarke Lane, which becomes Bent Twig Lane after the Children's Center.

The original Clarke Lane looped behind the Health Professions Center. That roadway has been closed due to construction of the Science and Education Center.

The one-way portion of Bent Twig Lane will continue around the Publishing Services Center to an intersection located near Reflection Lake and

the Liberal Arts Center. At the intersection, traffic will become two-way as it travels toward University Boulevard. University Boulevard will continue as a two-way street.

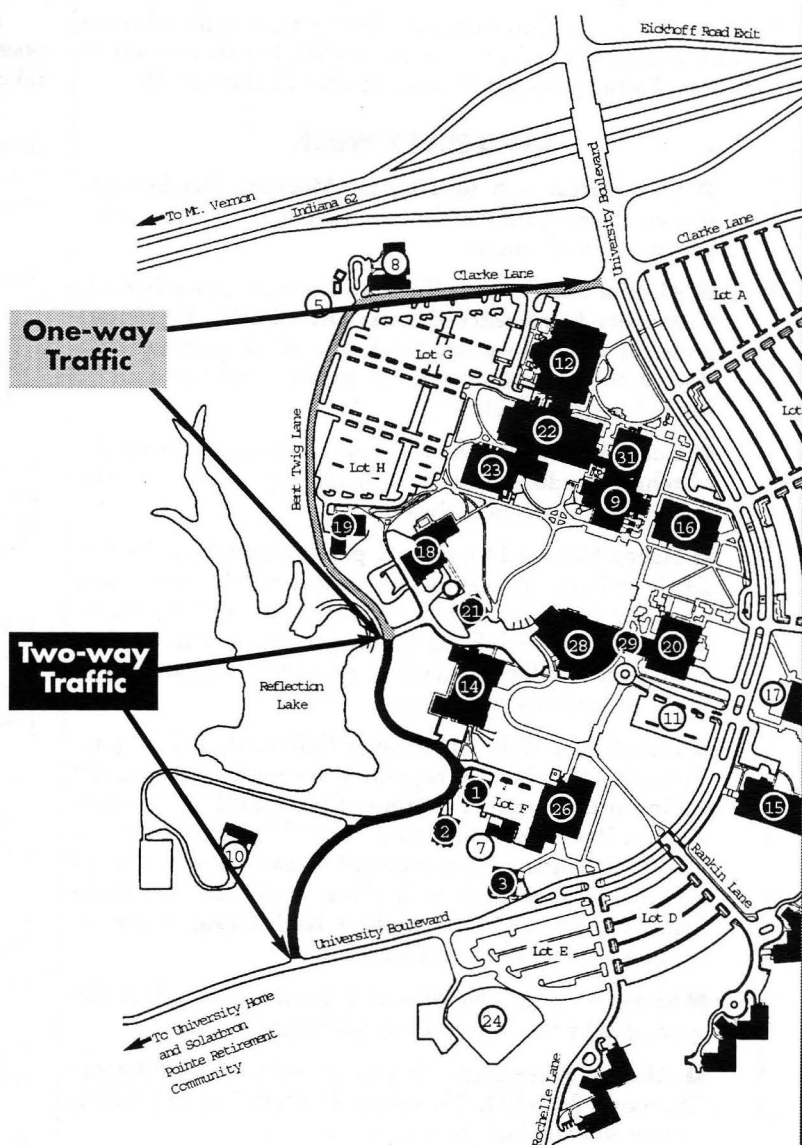
To access parking lots west of the Health Professions Center (lots G and H), drivers will follow Clarke Lane to Parking Lot G. The lot will have seven entrances along Clarke Lane and two exits along Bent Twig Lane.

An exact date for the opening of the one-way street is not available, but it is expected to be open sometime this month.

Alumnus to present Emmy award to USI

An Emmy Award-winning USI alumnus will present a special gift to the University Wednesday, October 24.

Mr. Dan Brumett, assistant director of *The Young and the Restless* and president/CEO of MDH Productions, will present one of his Emmy Awards to USI at 1 p.m. in Kley Meyer Auditorium, prior to an open house for the Scripps Howard Video Production Complex, also located in the Liberal Arts Center.

Brumett began his broadcasting career at the age of 16 at radio station WITZ in Jasper, Indiana. While attending University of Southern Indiana, he worked for various television and radio stations until 1972, when he relocated to California to begin his career with the networks.

He has worked as an associate director and videotape editor with ABC and CBS in Hollywood. For 23 years, Brumett was editor and associate director of CBS' highest-rated daytime drama, *The Young and the Restless*. His contributions to television have earned 12 National Emmy Awards, eight for editing and four in the directing category.

In 1998, Brumett co-founded MDH Productions Inc. He serves as president and CEO of the corporation that is dedicated to producing HDTV presentations for not-for-profit organizations as well as creating and producing original broadcast and HD-DVD programming.

Utilizing a dramatic approach in documentary productions, Brumett has produced videos for such not-for-profits as World Vision International and the Regional Organ Procurement Association.

He recently completed and released his first HDTV documentary for Operation Rainbow, an organization of Orthopedic Surgeons that performs surgeries on the underprivileged in Central America. The video is offered free of charge to any broadcaster wishing to air HDTV programming. Since its debut, money raised by the video has funded repeated medical team trips.

Dr. Iain Crawford, dean of the School of Liberal Arts, invites the University community to meet Brumett, attend his Emmy presentation, and tour the Scripps Howard Video Production Complex.

Oedipus to open season

The tragic tale of a young man's free will versus his fate will open USI Theatre's 2001-2002 season when Sophocles' *Oedipus* takes the stage Wednesday, October 17.

"USI Theatre's production of *Oedipus* will leave you feeling as though you have experienced the Greek tragedy in its original venue," said **Mr. Elliot Wasserman**, director and associate professor of theatre.

"As I worked with the play, I felt continually drawn to the image of the amphitheatre, to a hillside performance site spacious enough to include virtually every citizen of a city at one time, and the idea of assembling everybody at once imparts the larger notion that the play is much more about the public conduct of a man rather than his inner struggles."

Performances will be at the USI Theatre, 3001 Igleheart Ave. Curtain times include: 7 p.m. Wednesdays, October 17 and 24; 7 p.m. Thursdays, October 18 and 25; 8 p.m. Fridays, October 19 and 26; 8 p.m. Saturdays, October 20 and 27; and 2 p.m. Sunday, October 28.

Tickets are \$9 for adults, \$7 for seniors citizens or children younger than 18, and \$3 for USI students.

Subscriptions to USI Theatre's 2001-2002 season – *Oedipus*, *Sprint Scenes*, *The Odd Couple: The Female Version*, and *In the Boom Boom Room* - will be available until Tuesday, October 16.

Season ticket-holders also will receive a free pass to one of the productions to be showcased in the 2002 Region III American College Theatre Festival, which USI will host in January at The Centre in downtown Evansville.

The theatre festival competition will feature entries from colleges and universities in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Wisconsin. Students will display their skill in acting, design, playwriting, directing, and criticism.

The subscription price – for four USI shows and a free festival pass - is \$27 for adults, \$21 for senior citizens or children younger than 18, and \$9 for USI students.

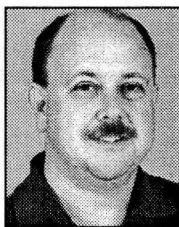
Achievements

Art test subject of colloquium

Dr. Joseph Uduehi, assistant professor of art education, will be the next speaker in the University's Liberal Arts Colloquium. He will present "Development and Use of the Uduehi Visual Art Test Instrument" from 3:30 to 5 p.m. Friday, October 26, in rooms 201 and 202 of the University Center.

Uduehi's test instrument assesses visual preferences for simple and complex two-dimensional designs. His presentation will include discussion of the test's development as well as application of the instrument in empirical research and teaching.

His scholarship - including "A Test Instrument for Assessing Cross-cultural Preferences of Design Elements" - has been included in a variety of publications. He has served as an editorial consultant on several projects and has made numerous conference and public presentations. Uduehi's artwork has been displayed in several group and solo exhibitions in Evansville.

The professor holds a B.A. in painting/drawing from Ahmadu Bello University, Nigeria, and an M.A. in art education/cinematography and an Ed.D. in art education, both from University of Illinois, Champaign. He joined the USI faculty in 1999.

The colloquium is a free lecture series featuring faculty research in the School of Liberal Arts.

Childhood the focus of conference

Dr. Thomas Moore, official musician of the National Head Start Association, will be the keynote speaker when USI hosts the 11th annual Early Childhood Education Conference from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Saturday, October 13, in the Health Professions Center.

An acclaimed children's recording artist, Moore has produced eight recordings used in classrooms nationwide. Open to individuals who work with children through age 8, the conference is sponsored by the University's Department of Teacher Education, the USI Children's Center, the Evansville Regional Association for the Education of Young Children, and the Vanderburgh County Step Ahead Council.

Dr. Christopher Adejumo, assistant professor of art education, University of Texas at Austin, will be the guest artist at USI's Saturday Art Workshop for Children.

Adejumo's artwork has been featured in solo exhibitions in Africa, Europe, and the United States, and he has received many research and academic excellence awards in the U.S. and abroad. His articles have been published in several newspapers and visual arts and research journals, and he has made contributions to art education through several innovative programs, such as "Children of the Future," a community art program, and research in community-based art education and multiculturalism.

Adejumo holds a B.A. in fine arts, graphic design, from University of Benin, Nigeria; an M.F.A. in visual designs, printmaking, from University of Massachusetts, Dartmouth; and a Ph.D. in art education from Ohio State University.

He will speak with workshop participants and USI art education students from 8 a.m. to noon, Saturday, October 13. Adejumo will make additional guest appearances on campus from 10 a.m. to noon and from 5 to 9 p.m. Monday, October 15.
