MAIN ENTRANCE CLOSED

The two temporary entrances from Highway 62 are open (see map) now that USI's main entrance has been closed for the duration of construction on the overpass entrance to the campus.

The intersection of Clarke Lane and University Boulevard also has been closed while it is rebuilt in conjunction with overpass construction. It is hoped the intersection will reopen by the start of classes on Monday, August 30, but extra detours will exist in the meantime.

Westbound traffic may use the Schutte Road/Clarke Lane access to campus. This traffic will be routed through the parking lots to the boulevard during reconstruction of the

University Boulevard/Clarke Lane intersection.


Eastbound motorists can enter the campus through a temporary entrance built some 400 feet west of the original entrance. Mr. Barry J. Hart, USI Security and Safety director, urges westbound motorists to consider using this entrance also. He noted the Schutte Road exit sits just beyond the crest of a hill and gives a limited view of approaching traffic, while the temporary entrance has an open view of traffic plus an extended storage lane to accommodate those making a left turn onto campus.

During the period the boulevard/Clarke Lane intersection is closed,

BE ALERT - DON'T SPEED

Stepped-up traffic enforcement will be in effect for about a month, as city, county, and state police join the effort to make access to the USI campus safer when classes start August 30.

County and city police have been enforcing

the speed limits along Highway 62 since last week. State police are expected to post a "wolf pack" (the small, usually unmarked cars) along the highway before the start of classes.

Mr. Barry J. Hart, USI Security and Safety

director, said a 45-mile speed limit has been requested and promised, but is not yet imposed. He urged everyone to be alert to existing enforcement efforts and the new speed limit, noting "The intent is not to give out a lot of tickets, but to make it safe to come to the USI campus." motorists using the temporary entrance may also use a campus service road behind the Science Center, Physical Plant, and Technology Center (see map) to reach the boulevard and parking lots.

Caution is urged, however, because the service road may occasionally be congested with construction equipment. Caution is urged also for detour traffic entering/exiting Clarke Lane at the USI parking lot -- most drivers making the sharp right from the lot to go east on Clarke Lane are turning wide, crossing the center line into the westbound lane.

All detours will be posted.

Everyone is advised to build in extra time and be prepared for delays and detours. Those living in campus housing may wish to walk or bike to classes.

Use mass transit — Evansville METS bus service is available.

Do not use McDowell Road — the section through Solarbron Pointe Retirement Center is private and not be open to through traffic.
