



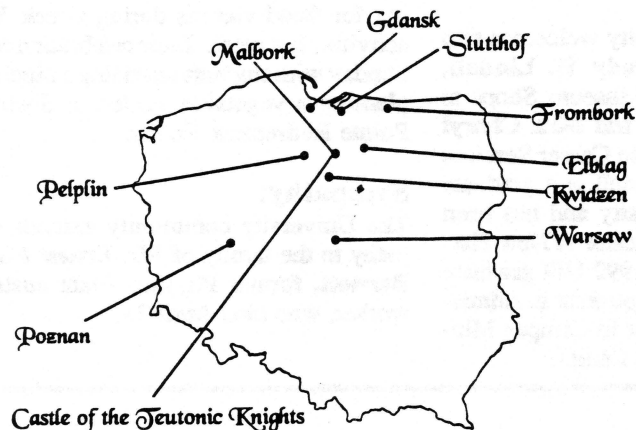

# Poland

## USI Madrigal Ensemble preparing for second tour of Poland

The USI Madrigal Ensemble, under the direction of Mr. Daniel R. Craig, assistant professor of music, is preparing for the group's second tour of Poland May 11-25. They will travel by bus to Chicago, board a 12-hour flight to Warsaw, then will fly to Gdansk, on the northern coast at the Baltic Sea.

While in Gdansk, the singers will present concerts of secular and sacred music ranging from medieval to modern masterworks. They will perform in Mariacki Cathedral, the largest cathedral in the world, and in several large churches and auditoriums as a part of the Gdansk Millennium celebration. At Mariacki, the ensemble will perform "Exultate Justi in Domino (Exult Righteous in the Lord)" by Andrej Hackenberger, who was the court composer of the Mariacki Cathedral during much of the late Renaissance. This piece was transcribed from ancient musical notation by Mr. Craig, especially for this tour. The singers will be hosted by the Gdansk chamber choir, Continuo, a mixed chorus based at the Gdansk Polytechnika Institute.

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## Forum on improved health care at lower cost planned

Company representatives will present case histories when USI hosts a program on Thursday, May 15, highlighting the new emphases in health care management, delivery, and cost. The program will be held from 8 a.m. to noon in Carter Hall, co-sponsored by the School of Nursing and Health Professions, the Tri-State Business Group on Health, and the Southern Indiana Labor-Management Education Forum.

Eight case studies will show what some Evansville area organizations are doing to promote employee wellness, with the accrued benefit of lower costs for companies and employees. The program will cover:

- How labor, management, and the health care providers are working together to help individuals become better health care consumers.
- How corporate initiatives such as group purchasing, self-care guides, and wellness programs are reducing the

cost of doing business.

- How having a healthier work force benefits everyone — the workers who miss less work and spend less on treatment, and the company which enjoys higher productivity and lower insurance costs.
- How organizations including churches, civic clubs, and social service agencies can become players in improving health care effectiveness in our community.

## Teacher recruitment slated:

The 11th annual Teacher Recruitment Day will be held from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuesday, May 6, in Carter Hall, with around 150 teacher candidates from USI, Brescia and Kentucky Wesleyan colleges, Oakland City University, and the University of Evansville expected to interview.

Around 50 recruiters from 27 school districts are scheduled to attend, from Indiana, Kentucky, Tennessee, Texas, Kansas, North Carolina, and New Mexico, compared to only 17 districts last year. A note of interest this year is the fact that the Memphis, Tennessee, schools are looking for 500 elementary and secondary teachers, a large portion of them in art and music.

Dr. Charles F. Harrington, director of institutional research, Dr. Joy V. Peluchette,

coordinator of the MBA Program, and Dr. Robert L. Reid, vice president for Academic Affairs, presented a workshop on "The Collection, Analysis, and Dissemination of Institutional Data in support of Institutional Self-Study" at the annual meeting of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, held April 18-22 in Chicago. ## Madrigal singers in Poland — *contd. from page 1*

On May 17 the ensemble will go to the industrial city of Poznan, where they will be hosted by the Chamber Choir of Adam Mickiewicz University. The USI singers will participate in the Poznan International Music Songfest and will present a joint concert with the AMU Chamber Choir. In the joint concert, Craig has been asked to conduct a combined performance of the "Ave Maria" text by Franz Biebl.

On May 19, the singers will go to Malbork, the site of the castle of the Teutonic Knights, the largest castle in the world. This superstructure was built in the 13th century to house the warring Germanic knights after the Crusades. Malbork will be the choir's "home base" while they perform concerts in the Pelplin Monastery, the Castle of Kwidzen, the Cathedral Church of Frombork, and the Castle of the Teutonic Knights. The Pelplin monastery is the former home of many notable Renaissance composers. The Cathedral Church in Frombork is where Nicholai Copernicus charted the skies. The singers will be hosted in Malbork by the Lutnia and Resonance choirs under the direction of Wawzyniec

Zamkowski. These are "town choirs" sponsored by the local government.

While in Poland the ensemble will sing in English, Latin, Swedish, German, Italian, Polish, Russian, French, and Hebrew. Several pieces were given to Mr. Craig by Polish composers and directors in an attempt to preserve Polish culture in a time when western influences are reigning supreme.

The USI Madrigal Ensemble will present a "bon voyage" concert at 3 p.m. Sunday, May 4, at St. Boniface Catholic Church, located on the corner of Wabash Avenue of Flags and Michigan Street on Evansville's west side. The concert is free and open to the public; donations will be accepted toward the expense of the 1997 concert tour. For information, call Mr. Daniel R. Craig, extension 1736.

### Reminder on grade posting:

Registrar John Deem offers the following reminder on the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974 as amended:

The public posting of grades either by the student's name, institutional student identification number, or social security number without the student's written permission is a violation of FERPA. Even with names obscured, numeric student identifier numbers are considered personally identifiable information. Therefore, the practice of posting grades by social security number or student identification number violates FERPA. Instructors who post grades should use a system that ensures FERPA requirements are met. This can be accomplished either by obtaining the student's uncoerced written permission to do so or by using code words or randomly assigned numbers that only the instructor and individual student know. The posting order should not be alphabetic. Any questions on grade posting may be directed to Mr. Deem in the Registrar's Office, extension 1761.

The 1998-99 student competition for USIA Fulbright and related grants is under way. Their purpose is to promote understanding between the U.S. and other countries through exchange of people, knowledge, and skills. Awards are available for graduate study or research in academic fields as well as for practical training in creative and performing arts. Teaching assistant grants are available for Belgium/Luxembourg, France, Germany, Hungary, Korea, Taiwan, and Turkey. This year 958 grants are available in all fields in more than 100 countries.

Most Fulbright-administered grants provide round-trip transportation, tuition, and maintenance for one academic year; a few provide international travel only, or a stipend intended as a partial grant-in-aid.
