## JAY FREDRICH, SHERRY BEGLE CHOSEN FOR HONORS

**Mr. Augustine Jay Fredrich**, professor of civil engineering technology and chairperson of the Engineering Technology Department, has been selected by his colleagues as the recipient of the 1993 Distinguished Professor Award. It includes a monetary award for Mr. Fredrich and a scholarship to be awarded in his name next year, all made possible by a gift from National City Bank.

**Ms. Sherry M. Begle**, an accounting major who completed work at USI with a perfect 4.0 grade point average and will graduate summa cum laude, has been selected to receive the President's Medal, the highest honor given to a USI senior. She was chosen by the Faculty Senate Student Academic Affairs Committee, based on her commitment to academic excellence and service to the University and community.

Mr. Fredrich joined the USI faculty in 1979 after a successful career with the Army Corps of Engineers, where he directed planning and design of water resource projects. He earned his B.S. from the University of Arkansas and M.S. from California State University-Sacramento.

His interest in young people is evident at the University and in the community:

## 850 ELIGIBLE TO GRADUATE

**Mr. Augustine Jay Fredrich**, professor of civil engineering technology and chairperson of the Engineering Technology Department, and **Ms. Sherry M. Begle**, a December accounting graduate, will be honored at the 1993 Commencement, when they will be presented the University's two highest awards, the Distinguished Professor Award and the President's Medal. Ms. Begle will graduate summa cum laude, having maintained a perfect 4.0 grade point average, the highest among 850 students eligible to receive their degrees in the ceremony at 7 p.m. Saturday, May 8, in Roberts Municipal Stadium. The graduates include 28 who will receive magna cum laude (3.8 GPA and above) honors and 45 who will receive cum laude honors (3.6-3.79 GPA).

Honorary Doctor of Laws degrees will be awarded to three individuals who have shown educational leadership while advocating human rights -- **Dr. Lorraine Matusak**, **Ms. Susan B. Enlow**, and **Mr. James B. Igleheart**. Dr. Matusak also will bring the Commencement address.

The USI Alumni Association's Senior Reception and Dinner will get under way at 6 p.m. Friday, May 7, with a social hour. The event has been moved to the Tropical Pavillion at the Ramada Inn. The association will present its annual awards -- Alumni Service Award, Distinguished Alumni Award, Faculty Recognition Award, and Special Recognition Award.

Saturday graduation activities on campus include: Ivy Tech Commencement, 10 a.m., Physical Activities Center; USI Dental Assisting ceremony, 11 a.m., Forum I; USI Honorary Degree Recipients Luncheon, 12 noon, University Home; USI School of Nursing pinning ceremony, 2 p.m., PAC; and reception for 1993 graduates, 4 to 5 p.m., University Home.

Dr. Matusak is the first Leadership Scholar at the W. K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, Michigan, and has been coordinator

and program director for Kellogg's leadership programming. Before joining the Foundation in 1982, she was president of Thomas A. Edison State College in Trenton, New Jersey; dean of the College of Alternative Programs at the University of Evansville; and professor of natural sciences at the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis.

As Kellogg's Leadership Scholar, Dr. Matusak writes, speaks, and consults with national organizations and foundations on leadership development. The author of numerous publications in the field of non-

traditional adult education and leadership, she has been asked by noted biographer and leadership scholar **Mr. James MacGregor Burns** to write the first book in a new series on leadership -- *The Library of Leadership* -- which will focus on the nature, meaning, future, and application of leadership.

Dr. Matusak received her bachelor's degree in biology and chemistry from the College of St. Benedict; master's degree in entomology from the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis; and doctorate in higher education administration from Fielding Institute of Graduate Studies in Santa Barbara, California.

Ms. Enlow is president and chief executive officer of the Enlow Foundation, which supports scholarships for minorities, female minority single parents, and the arts. She has been a major USI benefactor, establishing scholarships for deserving students as well as endowments to enhance the humanities.

Originally from Evansville, Ms. Enlow now divides her time between California and Indiana, with a special interest in the his-

dents experiencing academic difficulties.

\* He designed a Career Awareness in Science and Engineering (CASE) summer program at USI to interest middle school students in pursuing engineering or science careers, and found funding for the program from a federal grant, the Indiana Commission on Higher Education, and local business and industry.

\* Due to his years of extraordinary contribution to youth soccer, a local soccer field was named for him in 1988 and this spring, the Indiana Youth Soccer Association's highest award for individual service is being renamed the Jay Fredrich Award.

At USI, Mr. Fredrich teaches his regular undergraduate courses, plus a master's level interdisciplinary course on the world's cathedrals. He is the author of *Sons of Martha: Civil Engineering Readings in Modern Literature*, and currently is working on an "Art for Engineers" project to produce an exhibit of work by American artist Joseph Pennell for display at the 1993 American Society of Civil Engineers national convention. Mr. Fredrich's honors include 1985 Fellow of the American Society of Civil Engineers, 1986 ASCE Service to the Profession Award, 1991 Citizen Engineer of the Year in Zone II, and 1993 winner of the prestigious Julian Hinds Award for career achievement in water-resources planning and management.

Ms. Begle attended USI as a Presidential Scholar, having been the 1988 valedictorian at Southridge High School at Huntingburg. She completed work at USI in December and has been employed in the Indianapolis office of KPMG Peat Marwick public accountants, where she recently was promoted to staff accountant. She passed the Indiana Certified Public Accountants examination after leaving USI.

At the spring Honors Convocation, Ms. Begle was presented the Wall Street Journal Award, the Indiana CPA Society Award, and the Academic Achievement Award for Accounting. She also was named Outstanding German Student, received the Elks National Foundation Scholarship, and won regional first place and national second place in the APICS Donald W. Fogarty International Student Paper Competition.

Ms. Begle was a USI Student Ambassador, a member of Alpha Chi and Golden Key academic honoraries, president of the Accounting Club, secretary of the Student Alumni Association, and DPMA planning committee chairperson. She also was a member of the Institute of Management Accountants, Enlow Distinguished Scholar Committee, and the School of Business Student Advisory Council. While a student at USI, Begle held a cooperative education assignment with General Electric in Mt. Vernon.

 toric community of New Harmony. She is a member of the board of directors of the USI/Historic New Harmony Foundation, the New Harmony Memorial Commission, and the board of directors of the Posey County Community Foundation. She is an ordained elder in the Presbyterian Church. A graduate of Indiana University, she also attended the Medill School of Journalism at Northwestern University and earned a master's degree from the University of Evansville. From 1963 to 1986, she was corporate secretary of the board of directors of *The Evansville Courier*.

Mr. Igleheart, who represented southwestern Indiana as a member of the Indiana Commission for Higher Education for ten years, is an Evansville business and civic leader. He joined the International Steel Company in 1949 and recently retired as chairman of the board. He has been regarded as a national leader in the steel fabricating and manufacturing industry and has been a director of both the American Institute of Steel Construction and the National Association of Manufacturers. He is a past director of National City Bank in Evansville.

Mr. Igleheart also served as a member of the state board for Indiana Vocational Technical College for 12 years and is a former trustee of the University of Evansville. He was a founding member of the local chapter of Junior Achievement and of RESCUE, now known as Second Chance halfway house. He previously served on the Evansville Human Relations Commission and in 1977, received the Mayor's Human Rights Award. Mr. Igleheart is a director and past president of the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science, an elder at First Presbyterian Church, and a member of the Rehabilitation Center Board.

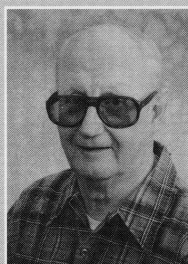

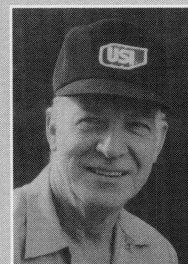
