VETERAN AFFAIRS PROGRAM

The office of Veteran Affairs at ISUE is arranging a class for military veterans on December 3 at 6:30 p.m. at North High School in Room 14. The class is being arranged to discuss educational benefits available to the veteran.

Education programs to be covered include high school and college programs, apprenticeship programs, vocational training, flight training, correspondence courses, and farm and industrial coop training.

The class is open to all veterans in the Evansville area. Donald Ramsden, ISUE Director of Veteran Affairs, will conduct the class. There is no charge and no prior registration is necessary to attend the session.
