PARTICIPANTS SOUGHT FOR CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION. USI faculty and students interested in debating the pro or con position on amending the Constitution are urged to apply to participate in the Evansville Jefferson Meeting on the Constitution slated Saturday, September 19, in the University Center. The event is co-sponsored by USI and the Evansville Bar Association as a commemoration of the bicentennial of the U. S. Constitution and has been underwritten in part by a grant from the Indiana Committee for the Humanities. The convention is based on a model proposed by the Jefferson Foundation of Washington, D. C., a non-profit organization established to promote informed, rational discussion of the fundamentals of the American system of government and to facilitate public understanding of how the Constitution was made. The meetings simulate the constitutional convention process, fostering debate on substantive issues while providing insights into the opportunities and dangers inherent in constitutional change. The mock convention will include a morning session in which delegates will discuss proposed Constitutional changes and prepare presentations for the plenary session which begins at 1 p.m. Each delegate will have an opportunity to participate in the plenary session. The issues -- from which two or three will be selected for debate -- include: constitutional amendment, term of office for federal judges, the presidential veto, direct election of the president, length of term for U. S. representatives, and limiting the president to one term.

There is a \$10 application fee to cover materials and lunch; it will be refunded if an applicant is not selected as a delegate. Student scholarships have been sought to underwrite student participation in the program. Delegates will be selected on the basis of achieving a representative group for debate and will receive copies of issues books and other materials to study prior to the convention. The pool temperature is maintained between 84 and 86 degrees, and the pool chemistry is properly maintained for your comfort and safety. Swim laps for fitness or just splash around and have fun. There are no special check-in procedures for morning and noon swimming; for evening swimming, present your faculty/staff ID at the counter to receive a pool pass; present the pass to the guard on duty. Equipment may be checked out at the PAC counter by depositing an ID. Lockers, locks, and towels may be obtained at the PAC counter for a \$4 refundable deposit; no deposit required for University employees and families.

All USI students; employees/families; Alumni Association/families; Varsity Club, All-American, Regal, Golden, and Silver Eagle members/families; and USI Foundation donors of \$100 or more and families will be admitted at no charge with respective IDs. Families include spouses and children, age 18 and under. Fees for the general public will be \$20 a month, with a three-month minimum required; a PAC 'n Pool Pass will be issued as ID. Each of these groups may have a maximum of two guests per visit, at no charge.
