



EMPLOYEE & STUDENT REDUCED FEES FOR NONCREDIT COURSES. At the March, 1977 meeting the Board of Trustees approved a policy enabling ISUE full-time students and ISUE employees to enroll in selected noncredit courses for one-half the regular registration fee. The reduced rate is applicable to employees only, not employee spouses and/or children.

To obtain the reduced rate, employees and students must wait until one week before the first meeting of the course to register.

Courses in the Fall Noncredit Series for which the reduced rate is applicable are: Officiating Men's and Women's Basketball; Investment Strategies: Stocks, Bonds, and Options; Appreciating Music: The Art of Listening; You and Others: An Introduction to Transactional Analysis; French for Travelers; Beginning Guitar; Gymnastics for Women; Assertiveness Training Workshop; Reading Efficiency; Personal Law; Discussions in Literature: Women from Eve to Erica; Amateur Radio License Preparation; Anthropology for Beginners; and all Yoga courses.

PHILHARMONIC SEASON OPENS. The Evansville Philharmonic Orchestra opened its season Saturday, September 17, 1977 at Vanderburgh Auditorium with a program of "Mostly Mendelssohn." Minas Christian conducted the symphony.

Christian came to Evansville in 1953 and under his direction, the Philharmonic has grown progressively to become a metropolitan orchestra with superb quality and high professional standards. The Orchestra now presents eight Subscription Concerts, two Pop Concerts, six Youth Concerts, the Tri-State Youth Concert, twelve Little Symphony performances and fifty-five performances of the Evansville String Quartet and the Philharmonic Woodwind Quintet.

Subscription series tickets are still available for the 1977-1978 season. Several guest artists will participate in a wide variety of music. Programs include James Kreger, cellist; Claude Monteux, flutist; Franco Gulli, violinist; Jorge Bolet, pianist; and Claude Kipnis, Mime Theatre.
