INTERNATIONALLY KNOWN ARTIST TO HOLD WORKSHOP AT ISUE. Internationally known artist Jane Abrams will give a slide presentation and lecture October 28, entitled "Sexual Politics in Language and Art" during a noncredit Lithography Workshop at ISUE.

She will conduct a week-long workshop at the New Harmony Print Workshop, October 27 - 31. John Begley, curator of the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, will print a limited edition from Ms. Abrams' finished plate, which may then be purchased through the New Harmony Gallery. All art produced during the workshop will also be sold at the New Harmony Gallery.

Ms. Abrams earned B.S. and M.S. degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Stout, and an M.F.A. from Indiana University. She was selected for Research and Graduate Studies Fellowships while at Indiana University. The Albuquerque, New Mexico, resident has won 16 awards and purchase prizes in national and international exhibitions during the past ten years.

Her work is included in collections of the United States Information Agency London Embassy in London, England; Indiana University Museum of Fine Arts in Bloomington, Indiana; University of Illinois in Macomb, Illinois; Potsdam University in Potsdam, New York; University of Dallas in Dallas, Texas; Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas; Minot State University in Minot, North Dakota; Museum of New Mexico in Santa Fe, New Mexico; University of New Mexico's Museum of Fine Arts in Albuquerque, New Mexico; East Carolina University in Greenville, North Carolina; and Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

Her national juried exhibitions for 1980 include "Alternatives 1980," "National Print Exhibition," "National Print Exhibition 1980," and "Eighth Annual Juried Exhibition." Her 1980 invitational shows include "8 x 10," "In Celebration of Prints," "Cupid, Venus, Folly, & Time," and "Degrees of Abstraction." These exhibitions include intaglio, photoetching, color xerox transfers, photographs, lithographs, and watercolors.

The slide presentation and lecture on Tuesday, October 28, at ISUE is free and open to the public. It will be held in A34 at 7:00 p.m. Due to limited facilities, permission to participate in the workshop must be obtained from Lennie Dowhie, ISUE Art Department. FACULTY EARLY RETIREMENT. The early retirement policy requires that the retiring faculty member make arrangements no less than a year in advance. For the first year of implementation, President Landini has waived that requirement, and notifications of early retirement, effective at the end of the spring, 1981 semester, will be accepted in Vice President Reid's office until November 14, 1981. For succeeding years, the full year's notice will be required.
