FOREIGN SERVICE OFFICER TO SPEAK. **Ms. Fredericka Schmadel Heard**, an Evansville native who was instructor in German at USI from 1979 to 1984 and now is a Foreign Service officer with the U.S. State Department, will speak at 10 a.m. Wednesday, July 20, in Forum II on careers in the Foreign Service. Ms. Heard has served in Maracaibo, Venezuela, and Reykjavik, Iceland. She joined the U.S. Embassy at the latter site only a month before the mini-summit in October 1986 between **President Reagan** and Russian **General Secretary Gorbachev**.
