PASS/NO PASS APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE THURSDAY

Faculty members please announce to your classes: Students wishing to apply for the Pass/No Pass Option may do so September 20 through September 27 at the Office of the Registrar.

Guidelines for the Pass/No Pass Option follow: only one course may be taken for the Pass-No Pass option per term; a maximum of four courses (excluding courses presently offered on a Satisfactory-Unsatisfactory basis) may be taken for Pass/No Pass and counted toward graduation requirements; a grade of P gives credit for the course but does not affect the Cumulative Grade Point Average; a student cannot change the decision of a faculty member in favor of a better grade once application for a Pass/No Pass is made.

TELENEWS CONFERENCE WITH SENATOR HENRY JACKSON

The Honorable Henry M. Jackson, Democratic Senator from Washington, will be the guest in an IHETS (Indiana Higher Education Telecommunication System) telenews conference on September 18 from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m. ISUE will be receiving the telenews conference in Room 127. Senator Jackson will be at Purdue University, and reporters throughout the state will be given opportunity to question the Senator.

Local media will attend this telenews conference at ISUE on September 18 to pose their questions to Senator Jackson. A television with the news conference will be set up in Room 126 for faculty and students wishing to view the conference. Only members of the media will be asking questions.

Senator Jackson served six terms in the U.S. House of Representatives, and was first elected to the Senate in 1952. He is Chairman of the Senate Interior Committee, a member of the Government Operations Committee, Chairman of the Permanent Sub-Committee on Investigations, (which is looking into the Wheat Deal), a member of the Armed Services Committee and also a member of the joint Committee on Atomic Energy. Word from Washington is that Senator Jackson is very much in the next race for President of the United States.

O.S.H.A. ORIENTATION DAY

An Occupational Safety Health Act orientation day has been scheduled by Charles Board, Director of Safety and Security for ISUE faculty, staff, and students. The O.S.H.A. legislation has caused considerable change in business safety procedures and labor relations. The O.S.H.A. orientation day will be held on Thursday, September 27, 1973. GUEST PROFESSORS ON CAMPUS

Dr. Barry Beyer, Professor of History at Carnegie Mellon University, will give a lecture entitled, "Inquiry in African History" on Saturday, September 29 to participants of the Division of Education sponsored In-Service Training in Human Relations. Dr. Beyer will be

speaking from 9 a.m. to 12 noon in Room 126. This is the first of a series of one-day sessions planned by Dr. Glenn Kinzie, Project Director of the HEW funded In-Service Training in Human Relations. Faculty and students are invited to the lecture.

Helen Sands, Assistant Professor of Speech, has arranged for Ronald Purtell, Coordinator of College Relations at Mead Johnson to speak to her Business and Professional Speech Class on September 18 at 9:30 a.m. in Room L103. His topic will be the job interview and how to prepare for it.

Mr. Minas Christian, Conductor of the Evansville Philharmonic Orchestra, will present a course of lectures at ISUE designed to provide background and analysis of the music to be offered in the current season of the Evansville Philharmonic Orchestra. The lecture will begin at 7:00 p.m. for four sessions on September 20, October 18, November 15, and November 29.

Mr. Christian will be lecturing on subjects relating to the first four concerts of the 1973-1974 season. Subjects will be the World of Gilbert and Sullivan, Van Cliburn, Piano, Sidney Harth, Violin, and Chihiro Kuda, Violin.

DECEMBER GRADUATES BEGIN GRADUATION CHECK-OUT

Students who are in their last semester of work should be completing graduation check-out procedures immediately. Meeting graduation requirements is each student's responsibility. Faculty members who have upperclassmen, particularly seniors, may wish to emphasize the importance of completing graduation check-out early.

Each student who is a candidate for a bachelors degree must meet the general requirements of the University. The following requirements apply to all students:

1. A student must have a minimum of 124 semester hours of credit. Some curricula or combination of fields require more. If all specified requirements are completed with fewer than 124 semester hours, a student must elect sufficient work to total at least 124.
2. A student must complete the minimum General Education Program.
3. All students who are candidates for a degree must have at least a 2.00 (C) average on all Indiana State University Evansville courses counted for graduation requirements.
4. Each I (incomplete) must be removed at least six weeks before the May commencement, if they are to be counted toward graduation requirements.
5. Course requirements for graduation in the student's area(s) of concentration may be those in effect at the time of matriculation or at graduation, but not a combination of both.
6. Students must earn a minimum of 30 semester hours of credit toward a baccalaureate degree from Indiana State University Evansville. The last five semester hours immediately preceding graduation must be completed in residence.
7. Students will not graduate if they have any financial obligations to the University.

Varsity Club Stag Highlights

The Screaming Eagles Varsity Club's Fall Stag, held on September 12, 1973, was a fine success with approximately 120 interested citizens, Varsity Club members and local sports media

personalities present. The Fall Stag was held at the Hilltop Grove on Detroy Road.

The featured speaker for the stag, Coach Jerry Altstadt, promised bright futures for the basketball and golf seasons.

The golf team boasts five returning lettermen, including Senior Dave Williamson (1973-74 Fendrich Open Champion), Junior Jim Hamilton (1971, 73 Evansville City Champion), and Stan Covey (1973 NAIA District #21 Champion). Also returning are sophomores Terry Kendricks and Stan Winecke. Newcomers Jeff Davidson and Steve Brown are freshmen from the Crawfordsville, Indiana area. Doug Foster, a freshman from Princeton and a high school sectional winner in 1973 and Don Wedeking, a 1973 Central graduate, are also prospective candidates for the squad. One of the pre-season pleasant surprises is Dave Kohlman, a sophomore in his first year of competition. To go along with this group in the spring will be Keith Bagby, a former letter winner, and Jeff Musgrave who was an extremely fine player at Rex Mundi High School. Last season the goal was to get to the NAIA finals and make the cut. This year, Coach Altstadt says, "We are going to be satisfied with nothing but being #1."

Seven lettermen plus four outstanding newcomers compose the 1973-74 basketball squad. Six returning lettermen scored over 100 points last season, and with good size, improved shooters, and experience in running the fast break Coach Altstadt hints at a winning season.

Returning seniors are Dave Williamson, 6' guard from Ladoga, Indiana, who averaged 12 points per game and was second in assists last year with 52; Bob Grannan, 6'3" forward from Rex Mundi who averaged 8.4 points and 7.3 rebounds for the Eagles last year; and Mike Young, who has 1 semester left and will serve in the capacity as a player-coach.

Juniors returning to the squad are Fred Chase, 6'6" forward from Mt. Vernon, who holds the single game scoring record of 41 points made against University of Missouri-St. Louis in the final game of the season; Jim Crisp, a 6'6" center from Elizabethtown, Ky., who pulled 5.6 caroms off the boards and averaged 7.0 points per game; George Davidson, a 6'2" guard from Harrison High who saw limited action last season and scored 111 points. Sophomore Terry Kirchoff, 6'4" center-forward from Freelandville, Indiana, saw considerable action last season as a freshman. Terry led the squad in rebounds pulling 177 from the board.

Newcomers include Ernie Brothers, a 6'2" guard from Vincennes High School. Ernie made the All SIAC, the All Sectional, the All Regional and All Semi-State teams in 1972. He had several offers from big schools but turned them down. He elected to stay at home for a year and attended Vincennes University. Ernie is an outstanding shooter and has tremendous desire. Other new faces are Mike Mattingly, 6'4" forward from Evansville Memorial and Rex Mundi. Mike is one of the top scorers in the city, last season averaging 17.5 points per game; Larry Ross, 6'4" forward of Evansville Rex Mundi averaged 18.5 points and 18 rebounds per game; and Ralph Schickel, 6'5" forward of Evansville Reitz played for Central Florida Junior College the last two years and averaged 10 points a game.

The first home game of the 1973-74 basketball season will be played on December 6 against Oakland City College.

The Varsity Club has netted over \$4,500 in the recent fall campaign. Varsity Club funds are used primarily for scholarships to talented athletes.
