TUNISIAN EXPERT TO BE FEATURED. Dr. Sabra Webber, an anthropology professor who gained expertise on Tunisia while serving there in the Peace Corps, will lecture on "Middle Eastern Lifestyles and Folklore" in the class on the Middle East at 12:30 p.m. Thursday, March 2, in SC290. The class is open to the public. Dr. Webber is an assistant professor at Ohio State University who is spending the current academic year with the Center for Islamic Studies and Civilizations at Washington University, St. Louis. She was in Tunisia from 1966 to 1968 and subsequently published Lisagharia, a compilation of Tunisian lullabies, nursery rhymes, and children's games. She is a native of San Francisco and received a B.A. from Occidental College, M.A. in folklore from the University of California at Berkeley, and Ph.D. in anthropology and folklore from the University of Texas, Austin.

The program is the first of two special events for the Middle East class to which the public has been invited. The second will feature demonstrations of Middle East dances, to be performed at 12:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 7, in Forum II. **Mrs. Sandra Hanes** of Boonville, who teaches dance in the Evansville area, will lead a group in demonstrating belly dancing and other traditional dances of the Middle East.

ARCHAEOLOGY LECTURE. Ms. Cheryl Munson, senior archaeologist with the Glenn A. Black Laboratory of Archaeology at Indiana University, will give a slide-illustrated lecture, "Looters, Archaeologists, Indians, and the Law: A Preliminary Report on Scientific Investigations at the Slack Farm Site in Kentucky and the Caborn Site in Indiana," at 2 p.m. Sunday, March 5, in Forum III. A reception will follow the lecture, to which the public is invited. Ms. Munson's talk coincides with release of the March issue of National Geographic, in which she is quoted extensively in an article about the looting at the Slack Farm. **Ms. Marjorie D. Jones**, special part-time instructor in sociology and anthropology at USI, has arranged the program.

\$47,055 PLEDGED IN TELEFUND. USI Alumni Association officials are well pleased with the \$47,055 pledged in support of Alumni and the University during the recent Telefund, a 14 percent increase over 1988 pledging. Individual pledges averaged \$28.50, a five percent increase, as 1,646 alumni -- a nine percent increase -- responded. There were 289 new donors. The record solicitation was accomplished by 120 alumni, student, faculty, and staff volunteers. **Mr. John Schutz**, a 1982 graduate and broker at Hilliard-Lyons in Evansville, chaired the fund drive which provides more than 80 percent of the Alumni Association budget supporting activities, scholarships and grants, restricted gifts, the scholarship endowment, and administrative costs.

DISABILITY AWARENESS MONTH. Congress has designated March as "Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month." Hoosiers with disabilities face challenges and barriers everyday -- physical such as curbs without cuts, steep inclines, etc., and attitudinal, which are harder to define and change. A pamphlet, "People First," prepared by the Governor's Planning Council on Developmental Disabilities, is being distributed by the Evansville Association for Retarded Citizens. It includes a glossary of terms and acronyms and a listing of telephone numbers for available resources. Call 428-4500 for a brochure or further information.

TELECONFERENCE. Corporate America is spending billions to help educate and train the work force. The U.S. Department of Labor predicts as many as 50 million workers may have to be trained or retrained over the next 12 years. A teleconference, "Business and Higher Education: Partnerships That Work," will be aired from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on Monday, March 6, in SCS9. **Mrs. Rebecca Englert**, coordinator of business and professional programs, said it is open to anyone interested in seeing how colleges with the most successful corporate education programs work with business and industry. Other topics will include: key program components, what corporations look for, size and scope of the training industry, assessing demand, and marketing.

NEW HARMONY GALLERY. **Mr. Larry Barnfield** and **Ms. Mildred Lachman-Chapin** will exhibit drawings and paintings in "Faces and Symbols From Within," artwork that explores the human psyche of its creators, during March at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art. The exhibition will open with a reception for the artists from 1 to 4 p.m. Sunday, March 5, and continue through March 29. At 2 p.m., the artists will lecture on "Two Views of Art Therapy: Historical, Personal." The reception and lecture are free and open to the public. **Mr. Barnfield** is a graduate of Eastern Illinois University and is an assistant professor of art therapy/art education at the University of Evansville and founder of Extended Care Specialists here. **Ms. Lachman-Chapin** is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania and American University. She is an author and nationally recognized art therapist and clinician.

EXPORT CONFERENCE. The Corporation for Indiana's International Future and the five state universities are sponsoring a statewide conference to encourage export development in Indiana. The day-long conference, "A New Era of Trade for Indiana," will be held Friday, March 31, at the University Place Conference Center, Indianapolis. It will cover 1988 laws affecting the international marketplace, expanded marketing assistance programs, and Indiana companies' successful strategies. **Dr. M. Edward Jones**, associate vice president for Academic Affairs and director of Extended Services, will moderate a session on general manufacturing which will feature Kimball International of Jasper and Red Spot Paint and Varnish Company of Evansville. EDIN WORKSHOP. A two-hour free workshop on accessing and using the Indiana Economic Development Network (EDIN) will be held for faculty and administrative staff members on Tuesday, March 28, sponsored by Continuing Education, Library Services, and the Computer Center. Two sessions will be offered -- 10 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 to 3 p.m. -- with each limited to 10 people. Call extension 1863 to register. EDIN has two data bases: STATIS (Statistical Information System) which provides economic and demographic data for Indiana, its 92 counties, and 230 selected cities, plus data for the 50 states and U.S.; and BASIS, which provides electronic mail, a calendar of economic development events, and a directory. STATIS contains statistical information from a broad range of federal, state, and local sources -- the Census Bureau, Bureau of Economic Analysis, Indiana Department of Employment and Training Services, Indiana Department of Revenue, and many others. An important feature is the ability of users to transfer data to their own personal computers for analysis, report writing, and graphics generation. The system may be accessed via SUCON and the only user cost is for computer time.
