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Deadline to register to vote in the Indiana primary is April 7 - forms available on campus, online

The deadline to register to vote in the Indiana primary is April 7. If you are not registered by April 7, you cannot vote. Students, faculty, and staff may obtain an Indiana Voter Registration Form from several convenient campus locations.

Voter registration forms also are available in the Vanderburgh County Election Office, public libraries, state license branches, and other locations. Mail-in voter registration applications must be postmarked no later than the registration deadline.

Eligibility

To be eligible to vote in Indiana, you must:

- be a citizen of the United States;
- be at least 18 years old on the day of the next general or municipal election;
- have lived in your Indiana precinct for at least 30 days before the next election; and
- not currently be in prison for a criminal conviction.

Contrary to popular belief, in the state of Indiana individuals who have been convicted of a felony and served their time are eligible to vote.

Early voting

In Vanderburgh County, early voting will be offered Monday, April 14, through Friday, May 2, at these locations:

You must show a government issued ID before you can vote. Voting hours are 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Friday.

Indiana residents attending USI from outside Vanderburgh County, as well as those students from other states, may register to vote in Vanderburgh County by using their local student address when completing the Indiana Mail-In Voter Registration Application.

Heritage Artisans Week offers something for all ages

Heritage Artisans Week, a week-long celebration of 19th century arts, crafts, and industry, begins Friday, April 21, on the grounds of the Atheneum/Visitors Center in historic New Harmony. Sponsored by Historic New Harmony with support from the West Side Nut Club, the event offers something to please all ages.

Heritage Artisans Week focuses on New Harmony's rich historical traditions, while featuring 19th century demonstrations by accomplished regional artisans in costume. Some of the returning demonstrations include spinning/weaving, bookbinding, soap making, cordwaining (shoe making), beekeeping, woodworking, rug making, and traditional Native American life and food.

Tinsmithing is a new demonstration to Heritage Artisans Week this year. **Jeff Goris**, a retired Industrial Arts teacher from Wabash High School, will be showcasing the art. While in New Harmony, he plans to make tin candleholders and lanterns. "All that shiny tin and the steady tap-tap of the mallet naturally invite curiosity. Visitors are intrigued how a tinsmith can turn a piece of flat metal into a three dimensional object," Goris said.

Gerry Barker of Frontier Resources will be providing several programs involving oxen and will include visitors in the demonstrations. "The Wagoner's Lad" is a program that re-enacts how to drive a wagon two hundred years ago, and he will request the help of a volunteer to assist with driving. "Logging with Oxen" is a program that will allow volunteers to test their skills at collecting and transporting logs with the help of oxen.

The Red Bank Reunion Band will play music from the 19th century during the mornings. They will dress in authentic costumes and discuss the music and their instruments. There also will be a demonstration featuring music played on the scheitholt and dulcimer, instruments that were originally part of southern Appalachian culture.

For those looking for a unique shopping experience, Heritage Artisans Week offers items that have historical significance but also fit a modern lifestyle. Items will include a wide selection of labyrinth items, as well as treenware and local pottery.

Craft demonstrations will take place rain or shine from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Tickets may be purchased at the Atheneum/Visitors Center, located at the corner of North and Arthur Streets in New Harmony. Group discounts can be arranged in advance for any day throughout the week. Entire families can

Taylor is a science consultant at Gryphon Scientific, where he provides scientific expertise to government and private clients. He presented the Pott College of Science and Engineering Alumni in Residence program "The Impact of International Health on National Security" on March 26.

He was formerly an American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) Science and Technology Policy Fellow, serving as a science advisor for the U.S. Department of Defense Biological Threat Reduction Program.

Taylor is a 1994 USI graduate with a Bachelor of Science degree in biology. He earned his Ph.D. in virology from Harvard University in 2002. As a postdoctoral fellow at Harvard Medical School, he identified host factors that are involved in herpes simplex virus replication and developed a West Nile virus vaccine.

Eagle Math returning

The USI Athletic Department is teaming up with the Mathematics Department to bring back Eagle Math - a math education program designed to encourage local elementary students to improve their math skills.

The annual Eagle Math event takes place Monday and Tuesday, April 21-22 in the Physical Activities Center (PAC) and returns after a one-year hiatus due to the extensive PAC renovations in 2007.

Randa Gatling, a women's basketball assistant coach, is heading up the 2008 Eagle Math event. "We will have about 850 students from 15 local schools participating this year," she said.

Eagle Math combines math and athletics in various demonstrations and activities presented by coaches and players of USI varsity sports.

"We're trying to make it fun," said USI men's head basketball coach **Rick Herdes**. "And hopefully it helps students understand the importance of math as a life skill."

Herdes will serve as the announcer for the event, asking math-related questions, introducing the activities, and just keeping the attention and interest of the students involved. "I guess you could say I'm the Bob Barker of this game show," he joked.

Stephanie Wilson, a senior chemistry major and a captain on the USI volleyball team, participated in the last Eagle Math event and understands the importance of math in athletics and, more importantly, in life.

"It's a necessity to have a good foundation in math because you encounter it in so many different places," Wilson said. "These kids see math everyday and may not realize it."

Besides helping the participating students improve their math skills, Eagle Math allows them to meet and interact with student-athletes and coaches who can be potential role models.

"Student-athletes are definitely admired," Wilson added. "We are showing younger students that we enjoy being positive role models, and we understand math is beneficial in life."

Both the USI coaches and athletes will convey the message of hard work, practice, and improvement. Athletes have to practice to get better at their respective sports, and students who practice math will perform better in the classroom.

The late **Dr. Charles Bertram** created Eagle Math in 1994 in an effort to intertwine math, community, and athletics. "Dr. Bertram thought this would be a great way for us to get to know the community and the community to get to know us better," Herdes said.

Fifth-Third Bank is partnering with USI for the Eagle Math event. Participating students receive a math workbook with a sports theme to practice math during and after the event. Students that complete the workbook receive money towards opening a Fifth-Third savings account.

USI Theatre presents Brecht and Weill's famed musical, *The Threepenny Opera*

USI Theatre presents *The Threepenny Opera*, with book and lyrics by Bertolt Brecht and music by Kurt Weill, at the Mallette Studio Theatre on the lower level of the Liberal Arts Center at University of Southern Indiana. The production, directed by Lenny Leibowitz, runs April 10 - 20.

Heralded as "one of the most powerful creations" of the 20th

century for managing "in one fell swoop to change the nature of musical theatre and of opera," *The Threepenny Opera* is set in London's Soho just before the coronation of Queen Victoria and reflects Brecht's delight in exposing corruption and skewering social conventions with humor and insouciance. John Jeremiah Peachum is the boss of London's beggars, setting each one up with a story and a street corner in return for a share of their take. The Peachums fear their business will suffer when their lovely daughter, Polly, leaves the fold to marry Macheath, the boss of a criminal gang that benefits from Macheath's old friendship with the police chief. They have Mack arrested in spite of his connections by threatening to unleash all the beggars at once, just before the Queen's coronation. Mack prepares for his execution, but at the last moment, he is granted a reprieve.

Proclaimed by *Newsweek's* Jack Kroll as "the greatest musical of all time," *The Threepenny Opera* ran off-Broadway from 1954 to 1961. Its cast album sold in record numbers, and its most famous song, *Mack the Knife*, became a standard. According to Leibowitz, assistant professor of theatre at USI and the director of the production, he selected the piece because, "It is the granddaddy of all conceptual musicals like *Cabaret* and *Chicago*. It is a pungent mixture of high culture and low farce; a strange compendium of opera, jazz, melodrama, and social effrontery."

In addition to Leibowitz, the artistic team includes USI theatre faculty members **Craig A. Young** as scenic designer and **Shan Jensen** as costume designer, and USI students **Sean Nicholl** as lighting designer and **Ryan Nash** as sound designer. The acting company includes USI students **Jeni Ahlfeld**, **Kensington Blaylock**, **Jeremy Brailsford**, **Amelia Dalto**, **Dinetia Dean**, **Brandon Eck**, **Preston Harris**, **Dunlap**, **Joshua K. Lenn**, **Jonathon Lutz**, **Jasmine Ruckriegel**, **Rachel Schenk**, **Paige Scott**, **Joshua Smith**, **Meredith Woodard**, and **Robert Wright**.

The Threepenny Opera runs April 10 - 13 and April 15 - 20 in the Mallette Studio Theatre on the lower level of the Liberal Arts Center at USI. Performance times are at 7:30 p.m., Wednesdays through Saturdays, and at 2 p.m. on Sundays. Ticket prices are \$12 for adults, \$10 for non-USI students and for seniors 60 and over, and \$6 for USI students. *The Threepenny Opera* contains adult language and themes. Tickets may be purchased by calling the USI Theatre box office at 812/422-3970 or at the door. The box office opens one hour before each performance.

Practice graduate exams offered April 19

The Law School Admission Test (LSAT) will be offered at 11 a.m. in Forum II; The Graduate Management Admission Test (GMAT) at 11:30 a.m. in Forum III; and the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) at noon in Forum I. The Medical College Admission Test (MCAT) may be offered if there is enough interest.

Any student considering graduate school (including a business program or law school) should participate. Each test will last up to three hours and will be proctored like an actual exam. After the test, there will be a question and answer period and guest instructors will give a short workshop on test-taking strategies. Registration is required; the fee is \$5.

The event is sponsored by the Psychology Club. **Dr. Julie Evey**, associate professor of psychology and the assistant dean of the College of Liberal Arts, said, "This is a great opportunity for students to see how they might score on the real test, and also get an idea of the kinds of questions that will be on the real test."

The tests will be scored and returned to the students at a later date with computerized feedback about their individual perform-

Students register online via MyUSI. Priority registration begins at 8 a.m. on Monday, April 7, and progresses according to the schedule found on page four of the class schedule and at www.usi.edu/reg/early.asp. Students register according to the total of their earned plus currently enrolled hours, and are encouraged to register on their first day of eligibility.

All continuing and readmission students are eligible to register online, but are urged to first meet with their academic advisor to review their course selection prior to registering. Contact your advisor to schedule an appointment (subject to availability).

Degree-seeking undergraduate students with less than 32 earned hours (freshmen) will have a registration hold placed on their record, and will be eligible for registration only after meeting with their academic advisor to review their course selection and remove the registration hold.

Degree-seeking undergraduates who began at USI in summer 1995 or later should review their Degree Evaluation (through MyUSI) prior to registration to check their progress toward degree completion and verify acceptable course options.

Students who sign up for classes during Priority Registration will not be billed until Monday, August 10, and expected to settle their account with the Bursar's Office by Wednesday, August 20.
