**NAMES IN THE NEWS.** **Dr. J. Eliseo Da Rosa**, professor of economics, has been elected co-chairman of the Committee XI: Natural Resources and Environmental Protection for the XXVI Conference of the Inter-American Bar Association, to be held May 9-15 in Buenos Aires, Argentina. The committee is preparing a model environmental code to be offered to the bar associations of Latin American republics for use in promoting legislation to protect natural resources. At the conference, Dr. Da Rosa will present a paper on "An Economic Evaluation of Environmental Protection Laws in the Rio de la Plata Countries." While in Buenos Aires, he also will lecture at the Fundacion ARN (Argentinian Foundation on Natural Resources).
