HUMANITIES WORKSHOPS. "Integrating the Humanities in the Evansville Area" will be the theme for a series of humanities workshops August 22-24, a program funded by the Lilly Endowment through USI's Extended University Program. The program is being coordinated by Dr. John H. Gottcent, USI professor of English, who said it is designed to open and enhance lines of communication between area high schools, colleges, and the arts community. "ALWAYS A RIVER"

The "Always a River" exhibit will dock at Mt. Vernon, Indiana, on Friday and Saturday, August 23-24. The barge will be open for tours from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily.

The community's 175th Anniversary celebration has been planned in conjunction with the barge visit. Friday events include tours of the renovated Posey County Courthouse from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and a laser light show at the Mt. Vernon High School auditorium at 6 and 8 p.m. On Saturday, the anniversary bring-your-own-basket picnic will be held from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. in Brittlebank Park; there will be a Civil War encampment, a tennis tournament, and hot air balloon tether rides. Other special activities will include magic shows at 12:30, 2:30, and 4 p.m.; old-fashioned children's games, 1-4 p.m.; old-fashioned ice cream social, 6:30 p.m.; bingo from 7 to 10 p.m.; and a country/country rock dance at the Coliseum teen center, 9 p.m. to 12 midnight.

"Always A River: The Ohio River and the American Experience," is sponsored by the humanities councils of Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia, and supported by a \$175,000 Exemplary Award grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. The exhibit is interactive, with visitors able to experience the story of the Ohio River.

AIDS PEER FACILITATORS. In July, Ms. Becky Coble, intermediate secretary in Health Services, completed 48 hours of instruction to become an AIDS peer facilitator trainer, one of eight in Indiana. A training program has been scheduled tentatively for late September. Peer facilitators are college students trained to present information on HIV/AIDS to small groups (classes, clubs, and organizations). The program is unique to Indiana, started in a cooperative effort between the State Board of Health and the Indianapolis Chapter of

American Red Cross. USI has been active with it from the beginning.

NEH GRANTS. USI may nominate three faculty members for the National Endowment for the Humanities summer stipends which provide support for persons working in the humanities so that they can devote two consecutive months of full-time study and research to their projects. A project may be one that can be completed during the stipend tenure, or it may be part of a long-range endeavor. Each award is \$4,000; winners will be announced in mid-March. GRANT OPPORTUNITY. Each year the National Humanities Center supports advanced study in the humanities by awarding 30-35 fellowships to scholars of demonstrated achievement and to promising younger scholars. Fellows are expected to pursue their own research and writing in residence at The Center in the Research Triangle Park of North Carolina. In addition to scholars from fields normally associated with the humanities, representatives of the natural and social sciences, the arts, the professions, and public life may be admitted to The Center if their work has humanistic dimensions. HEALTH TIPS from the Human Resources Department

If you have seasonal allergies, you don't have to give up exercising outdoors. Just follow these tips from *Vitality* (April 1991):

- * Avoid exercising in the early morning (5-10 a.m.), when plants produce the most pollen.
- * Avoid exercising on windy days.
- * After exercising, wash your hair and hands and rinse your eyes with cool water to clear away clinging allergens.

Other tips from *Vitality*:

Low-fat cheeses are not - they are lower in fat than regular cheese, but most of their calories still come from fat.

Many canned soups are loaded with fat and calories, but the following have less than 20 percent calories from fat: Campbell's tomato, Progresso black bean and lentil, and Stouffer's split pea.

Broccoli, cauliflower, and other cruciferous vegetables help protect against breast cancer. One of their ingredients -- indole-3-carbinol -- breaks estrogen into inactive by-products. It is estrogen's active by-products that seem to promote tumors.
