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DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR LECTURE. Dr. Wanda Best Hibbitts, an associate professor of business at USI since 1973, will present the Distinguished Professor Lecture at 3 p.m. Friday, February 20, in Forum I. Her topic will be "Higher Education and the Kondratieff Wave." A wine and cheese reception will follow her lecture. Dr. Hibbitts was selected for the 1986 National City Bank Distinguished Professor Award, recognition for faculty members who have demonstrated a dedication to teaching and a quest for excellence. It is supported by a \$1,000 grant from National City Bank.

Dr. Hibbitts' nomination included comments from more than 20 colleagues and current and past students, all in agreement that she has maintained the highest level of academic skill in order that she might better teach those who crowd into her classes. Both faculty and students noted she always finds time to assist them, whether in class work, in finding a job, or in problems encountered on the job long after graduation. Dr. Hibbitts is an Evansville native who grew up in Owensboro, Kentucky. She received her A.B. degree in business education from Bowling Green College of Commerce (now Western Kentucky University) in 1943 and her M.B.A. from Indiana State University in 1970, when she joined the USI staff as a business instructor. She became a Certified Public Accountant in February, 1973, and earned her Ph.D. in 1984. Dr. Kenneth Settle, chairman of the Division of Business, noted in his nomination that Dr. Hibbitts' "level of scholarship is reflected in her motivation to enter a doctoral program after passing the State of Indiana C.P.A. examination in 1973. Her pursuit of a doctoral degree is especially significant in light of the fact that individuals holding a master's degree and CPA are considered terminally degreed in 80 percent of all U.S. collegiate schools of business." A total of 134 doctoral degrees in accounting were granted in 1984).

Dr. Hibbitts held accounting and other office jobs in private industry prior to becoming an accounting teacher at Lockyear College of Business in 1956. She remained there until enrolling in ISU in 1969 to start work on her M.B.A. She was a graduate assistant in the ISU Accounting Department during that time. Dr. Hibbitts is recognized for innovative teaching techniques, with the academic excellence of the USI accounting program evidenced by the outstanding performance of its graduates who sit for the Indiana CPA examinations and their recruitment by national, regional, and local accounting firms. Dr. Hibbitts maintains membership in six professional organizations, is past president of the American Society of Women Accountants, and currently serves on the board of directors of the Indiana Association of CPAs (southern region). She has worked with Junior Achievement and was responsible for the organization of volunteers to provide income tax assistance to elderly and indigent citizens in Evansville and Mt. Vernon. She organized and has served as faculty advisor to the League of Professional Women and the Accounting Club, and has been an active member of numerous faculty and university committees. Dr. Hibbitts also has

operated her own public accounting business, has been a consultant on numerous accounting system development projects in the area, annually prepares tax returns for individuals and small businesses, and currently is serving as an expert witness on accounting procedures in a multi-million-dollar legal action pending in U.S. District Court, having been recruited by a major Indianapolis law firm on the basis of her prestigious reputation in the areas of Accounting and Auditing Standards. Dr. Hibbitts plans to take early retirement from USI at the close of the spring semester.

HONOR STUDENT SYMPOSIUM SATURDAY. The Honor Student Symposium on Education will be held at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, February 14, at USI, with 39 students expected to participate in presentations and a discussion period on the values of a liberal arts education. The symposium is designed to acknowledge student achievement and to stimulate student thinking about education. Faculty participants strongly endorse a liberal arts curriculum and each will address the value of traditional liberal arts disciplines in a well-rounded education. Morning sessions will be devoted to presentations on the various disciplines by: **Dr. Sherry Darrell**, associate professor of English; **Dr. Darrel Bigham**, professor of history; **Dr. Marlene Shaw**, associate professor of biology; **Dr. Joseph Palladino**, assistant professor of psychology; **Dr. Donald Wolfe**, assistant professor of German; and **Dr. Marie G.
