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CAMPUS SAFETY. Last week at USI was particularly trying for all members of the University community. A student reported she was raped on campus September 7 and, in response to that news, the University has been attempting to inform faculty, staff, students, and visitors of the need to protect themselves.

There have been campus-wide expressions of concern for the victim of the attack. The primary efforts now are directed to doing everything possible to keep violence from ever occurring again on our campus. A flyer which was circulated to students and employees is attached to University Notes. Please read it carefully and follow the procedures suggested for your safety. Share the information with students so we make certain everyone is informed. Open, frank discussions in class, even if brief, will help dispel rumors and foster understanding.

The University also had two bomb threats last week. We now have, through Indiana Bell, installed equipment which can help track the source of future threats. If such a call comes in on your phone, follow these procedures:

- 1] Stay calm.
- 2] Try to get details -- WHAT, WHEN, WHERE -- from the caller: which building, what time, location in the building. . .
- 3] Write down the exact time of the call, the extension which received the call, and the exact words of the caller.
- 4] **Immediately call Security, extension 1780, to report the threat.**

ASSESSMENT TELECONFERENCE. The Office of Academic Affairs is hosting a national teleconference, "To Improve Student Learning and Development: A Shared Responsibility," from 1 to 3 p.m. Friday, October 7, in UC353. menting the USI program. The teleconference will be an important resource in becoming familiar with the assessment movement. Key topics are: assessment to improve student learning and development, assessment to assist a diverse student body, strengths and limits of standardized tests, and meeting state mandates.

A reminder: The Task Force on Assessment has decided to use the Academic Profile published by the Educational Testing Service to assess incoming freshmen. NAMES IN THE NEWS. Four University of Southern Indiana administrators and faculty members will be session leaders for the national education conference September 28-30 in Kansas City. The conference, cosponsored by Northwest Missouri State University and the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), will have the theme, "Keeping the Promise: A National Conference on Improving Quality in Undergraduate Education."
