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ACCOUNTING MAJOR WINS PRESIDENT'S MEDAL. Staci Friedman Armstrong, a 21-year-old Gibson County native who completed work in December, 1986, on an accounting degree, has been selected as the recipient of the 1987 President's Medal. Mrs. Armstrong was presented the prestigious medal at the 1987 Honors Day program Tuesday, April 21, in which more than 60 grants and scholarships were awarded, ranging in value from \$100 to \$1,000 and recognizing students in each of the seven academic divisions as well as in university-wide categories.

Mrs. Armstrong, a staff accountant at Gaither Koewler Rohlfer Luckett & Company, Evansville, left the University with a 3.89 grade point average. She was on the dean's list each semester of her university career but found time for intra- and extracurricular activities that made her a leading candidate for the President's Medal honor which is based on commitment to excellence on the academic level as well as service to the University and community. Consistently lauded by nominating professors for her "warmth of personality" and "willingness to serve others," Mrs. Friedman had served as a mathematics and English tutor for other USI students the past two years. "Her accomplishment is the ability to translate complex ideas to simpler ones without losing sight of the original idea," stated one professor. "I've never trusted a student to teach excellently and kindly as much as I trust Staci."

Mrs. Armstrong's pursuit of an accounting degree from USI was aided by a USI academic scholarship, a National Association of Accountants scholarship, and an Indiana CPA Educational Foundation grant. She was a member of the USI Accounting Club, serving as senior representative in 1986; the Administrative Management Society student chapter, serving as president in 1986; the League of Professional Women; and National Association of Accountants. She became a charter member of USI's Indiana Iota Chapter, Alpha Chi National Scholarship Society, serving as its first treasurer and now, as vice president. She also is a charter member of the recently organized Golden Key National Honor Society at USI. Mrs. Armstrong is a member of Immanuel Lutheran Church, where she is secretary this year and a member and vice president of the Aid Association for Lutherans. In addition to her tutorial work at USI, she participated in the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program and was part of an Academic Affairs group that adopted two needy families in the community at Christmas 1986. Mrs. Armstrong also worked as a secretary in the Academic Skills Department at USI prior to joining Gaither Koewler Rohlfer Luckett & Company in December, 1986. She and her husband, Mr. Tim Armstrong, a 1983 USI accounting graduate who is employed at Grasso, Inc., live at 16820 Old State Road, Evansville.

MAGNA CARTA AT USI. Judge Gene Brooks, chief judge of the U.S. District Court of Southern Indiana, will be the featured speaker for an invitation-only breakfast at 7:30 a.m. Thursday at the University Center, introducing the "Roads to Liberty: Magna Carta to the Constitution" exhibit at USI. The breakfast is co-sponsored by the University and the Evansville Bar Association. Mr. Tom Capshaw, administrative law judge for the Social Security Administration and chairman of the Evansville Committee for the Bicentennial of the Constitution, will give an orientation to the exhibit. Also on the program will be Bar Association President John Whinrey; USI President David L. Rice; Evansville Mayor Michael D. Vandeveer; Mr. Robert A. Hon, president of the Student Government Association; and Father Anthony Kissel, director of Campus Ministry. Following the half-hour breakfast program, guests will tour the Magna Carta exhibit in the Physical Activities Center.

"Roads to Liberty: Magna Carta to the U.S. Constitution" -- a major exhibition of rare and historic documents including the 772-year-old Magna Carta, the 1787 Pierce-Butler draft of the U.S. Constitution, and an original Declaration of Independence broadside -- will be on exhibit Thursday and Friday, April 23 and 24. Admission is free. Student bus tours are being accommodated between 9 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. each day. Public hours for the exhibit will be 1:30 to 7 p.m. on Thursday, and 1:30 to 6 p.m. on Friday. If the wait to view the exhibit becomes excessive, the line may be closed earlier than announced. University faculty and staff may tour the exhibit between 8:30 and 9 a.m. Friday or work yourselves individually among school tours Thursday and Friday mornings.

MAGNA CARTA TRAFFIC CONTROL. Mr. John Klingelhoefer, supervisor of the Physical Plant and Security, urges all students, faculty, and staff to make arrangements for carpooling or walking to campus, if possible, for the two days of the Magna Carta Exhibit. To deal with the expected high-traffic levels -- more than 3,000 visitors are expected each day -- the following measures have been undertaken:

1) The Sheriff's Department will direct traffic entering and exiting the campus from Highway 62.

2) The Civil Defense will direct traffic on campus, to and from parking. Students, staff, and faculty will be directed, in order of priority, to Parking Lots A (north), B (central), and C (south); visitors will be directed in priority to C, B, A, then to temporary "overflow" parking.

3) One bay of Parking Lot C (south) near the main entrance to the Physical Activities Center will be reserved for bus parking.

MATH CONTEST SATURDAY. Some 330 students from 15 area high schools are expected to participate in the Indiana State Math Contest Saturday, April 25, in Forum I and II, sponsored by the Indiana Council of Teachers of Mathematics. Dr. David W. Kinsey, associate professor of mathematics, is host site coordinator, while Dr. Victoria Pohl, professor of mathematics, prepared the geometry test that will be used in the contest. USI is one of 14 sites in the state contest in which students will be tested in algebra I, geometry, algebra II, and comprehensive; the top three scorers will be recognized at each site, with those scoring in the top five percent statewide to receive "Outstanding Scholar" designations. The contest will be held from 9:30 to 11 a.m. and will be followed by an hour-long math competition presented by USI's math department. Dr. Gurol Irzik, visiting assistant professor of mathematics, is in charge of this voluntary competition that is designed to allow the contestants to relax and have fun.
