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**DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR LECTURE SLATED.** Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, will deliver the Distinguished Professor Lecture Wednesday, February 27 at 3:00 p.m. in Forum One of the Administration Building. Last spring, when Dr. Pitzer was named 1984 Distinguished Professor, his faculty colleagues cited the high degree of excellence he has maintained in teaching and scholarship throughout the years. As an author and scholar, his research on communal societies is respected and quoted throughout the world. Dr. Pitzer was the founder of the National Historic Communal Societies Association, which has its home in the University Library, and since 1974, he has organized and directed the group's conferences attended by scholars throughout the United States and several foreign countries. While on sabbatical from ISUE in 1983, Dr. Pitzer was the scholar-in-residence at Harvard University, and also prepared and presented the Colston Lecture at the Colston Symposium on Utopias at the University of Bristol in England. He has traveled widely and lectured in many foreign countries. In November, he gave the guest address, entitled "The Owenite Tradition in America", to the 25th anniversary meeting of the Robert Owen Association of Japan, meeting in Tokyo.

Dr. Pitzer received the Ph.D. and M.A. in history from Ohio State University. He also studied at Pennsylvania State University and Messiah College and received the A.B. degree in humanities from Wittenberg University. He has been on the faculty of ISUE since 1967. His publications include American Communal Music of the 18th and 19th Centuries, New Harmony's First Utopians, New Harmony's Fourth of July Tradition, and Robert Owen's American Legacy.

All members of the University community, and members of the public, are invited to attend the Distinguished Professor Lecture.
