DR. JACKSON TO BE CONFERENCE SPEAKER

Dr. Philip W. Jackson, University of Chicago educator and author, will be the keynote speaker for the opening dinner meeting at 6 p.m. Thursday, March 17, in the UC Dining Room of the 17th annual Society of Educators and Scholars Conference.

Dr. Jackson is Shillinglaw Distinguished Service Professor of Education and Psychology at Chicago. He is author of *Life in Classrooms* and co-author -- with Dr. Robert Boostrom, assistant professor of education at USI, and Dr. David Hansen of the University of Illinois-Chicago -- of *The Moral Life of Schools*. The latter book attempts to delineate the ways teachers and the schools exert moral influences -- good and bad -- on children at each grade level, some overt, many so subtle as to be overlooked by all participants. The book was part of a Jossey-Bass series for educators.

At the dinner, Dr. Jackson will be honored with membership in Kappa Delta Pi's prestigious Laureate Chapter which was chartered in 1925 "to promote excellence in and recognize outstanding contributions to education." Chapter membership is limited to 60 persons nationwide, with members selected biennially; eight vacancies exist.

The Society of Educators and Scholars was developed by leaders in education, administration, community affairs, business, and the social sciences who believe that in a rapidly changing world all knowledge is integrated and opportunities must be provided to exchange ideas and information from all fields. Friday's agenda will include paper presentations from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the University Conference Center. The conference will close with a reception at 5 p.m. at the Executive Inn.

NCAA REGIONAL FRIDAY NIGHT AT USI

The USI Eagles, 24-3 for the season, were handed the No. 2 seed Sunday by the NCAA Division II basketball committee and will host the final games of a Midwest Division II regional this weekend at the PAC.

At a Tuesday night (March 8) "play in," host Kentucky Wesleyan defeated St. Joseph's College while Oakland University took Quincy University out of the running. On Friday night, the two Michigan schools -- Oakland and Wayne State -- will play at 6 p.m. and USI and Kentucky Wesleyan will take to the court at 8 p.m. for their third meeting this season. The consolation game will be at 6 p.m. Saturday, March 12, with the regional championship game at 8 p.m. The winner moves on to "Elite Eight" competition March 23, 24, and 26 in Springfield, Massachusetts.

Regional tickets went on sale to the public Wednesday at the PAC, and were expected to move rapidly. Ticket prices are set by the NCAA -- \$16 for chairbacks, \$12 for bleachers; a ticket for the student-only End Zone bleachers is \$8 for the two nights.

The Lady Eagles finished 17-10 for '93-94 -- their best season ever -- but failed to receive a Division II tournament bid. Teams selected for the women's tournament are Northern Kentucky, Lake Superior State, SIU Edwardsville, Michigan Tech, Oakland, and Bellarmine.
