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INSTITUTE ON PEACE SERIES. Bishop George Fulcher, one of the principal authors of the American Catholic Bishops' Peace Pastoral, "The Challenge of Peace: God's Promise and Our Response," will speak at the ISUE Peace Institute on Tuesday, November 8. The fourth presentation of the Campus Ministry-sponsored series will take place in the University Conference Center, Room 350, at 12:30 p.m.

Reverend Fulcher has been Bishop of the Lafayette, Indiana Catholic Diocese since last February. Prior to being appointed bishop, he had spent his career in assignments in the Diocese of Columbus, Ohio. He is a member of the National Council of Catholic Bishops, a member of the Doctrine Committee and of the War and Peace Committee. He is chairman of the Follow-up Committee on the Bishops' Pastoral on War and Peace.

SUMMER FELLOWSHIPS FOR FACULTY. A new fellowship program of the Indiana Committee for the Humanities will award up to six stipends of \$4,00 each for two months of independent summer study in 1984. College and university faculty members are eligible to apply if they are residents of Indiana and have advanced degrees in one of the humanities disciplines.

These new fellowships, according to Dr. James Blevins, chair of the ICH Board, "are designed in such a way that the general public will benefit from the study as well as those who need support for concentrated study in the humanities."

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. Delbert Clayton, assistant professor of marketing, will be one of six economists featured at the Metropolitan Evansville Chamber of Commerce Economic Outlook Luncheon November 8. The panel will discuss and project Indiana's and Evansville's economic trends and the effect of those trends on business and industry in the coming year.

Dr. Howard Dunn, professor of chemistry; Dr. Benjamin Miller, associate professor of physics; and ISUE students Julie Little and Melinda Phillips attended the Indiana Academy of Science Fall Meeting October 27-29 at Indiana University-Purdue University-Ft. Wayne. Melinda Phillips presented a paper entitled "The Reaction of Aroyl Chlorides with 1,1-Dichloroethene: The First Reported Synthesis of β,β,β -Trichloropropiophenones" which detailed results of research she accomplished at ISUE with Dr. Dunn, B. G. Addison, and Phyllis Peters. The research involves the discovery of a new classification of inorganic compounds.

On October 11, the Evansville Association for the Blind recognized Dr. David Kinsey, associate professor of mathematics, for his ten years of service to its Board of Directors. Mr. Alan Morman, Board president, presented Dr. Kinsey with a plaque of appreciation. Dr. Kinsey has been a vice-president of the Board since 1978.
