SPECIAL RATES FOR ISUE EMPLOYEES ON CHICAGO THEATRE TOUR. NOMINATIONS SOUGHT FOR LIBERAL ARTS AWARD. The Liberal Arts Award was presented for the first time at the Honors Day Ceremony in the spring of 1982. It is an award committed to recognizing as well as promoting the ideals of liberal learning and the pursuit of excellence in (a) academic achievement in the liberal arts and science, (b) a noteworthy adherence to those virtues that mark a person of integrity, and (c) the pursuit of excellence in physical activities. The award criteria are as follows:

1. Recipients must be enrolled as full-time students at the time a recommendation is made and be at least in their junior year.
2. Recipients may be majors in any degree-granting program at the University. Students are not disqualified by virtue of their professional and vocational goals. They are qualified by virtue of the overall integrity of their student life.
3. Recipients will have demonstrated achievement in reading, writing, and mathematics, and demonstrated a well-balanced and well-sequenced involvement in those areas constituting the liberal arts and sciences.
4. Candidates will be asked to write and submit an essay on a topic related to liberal learning.
5. The recipient should be a well-balanced individual, exemplified in mind, character, and body.

The Student Academic Affairs Committee, which will evaluate the applicants, has set an application deadline of March 5. All faculty are asked to encourage all qualified students to apply. A dossier should be prepared including relevant materials such as letters of nomination and/or endorsement, transcript, vita, testimonials, and any other materials the applicant deems applicable. This information should be forwarded, no later than March 5, to Dr. Helen Sands, chair of the Student Academic Affairs Committee.
