Groundbreaking planned for New Harmony park

A groundbreaking ceremony will be held at 9 a.m. Tuesday, November 1, signaling the start of construction for the \$150,000 New Harmony Church Park project which will cover more than half of the block bounded by Church, West, Tavern, and Main streets in downtown New Harmony.

The ceremony will be held at the corner of Church and Main. Light refreshments will be served at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, compliments of the Red Geranium.

A special guest will be Judy O'Bannon, wife of the Indiana lieutenant governor and a member of the board of Indiana Main Street Program. New Harmony recently joined 135 other Hoosier towns as an Indiana Main Street Community, a program promoting community progress based on preservation and downtown development.

The groundbreaking will initiate the first phase of park development - the installation of a regulation basketball court at the corner of West and Tavern to replace an old facility and spruce up an area that is a

The second phase next spring will be construction of a structure to display the Harmonist Church doorway, a relic from the 1822 Harmonist Church which originally occupied the park site. The proposed site on Church Street is believed to be the door's original location.

All but the east wing of the Harmonists' brick church was razed in 1874 and the bricks used to build a wall around the Harmonist cemetery to preserve it as sacred ground. At the church site, a public school was built with funds provided by the Harmonists, and the Harmonist door became its north entryway. The school burned in 1913 and was replaced by another school in which the door became the west entry. This school was torn down in 1988 and a subsequent archeological dig located the foundations of the original building and many artifacts from the site's history.

The church park will be completed in the summer of 1995. It will include landscaping that outlines the original church and encloses a sunken area where seats will


Open enrollment

The product of nearly two years work by trained researchers and field surveyors for Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana, it is an inventory of about 6.500 sites and structures selected on the basis of historical significance, architectural merit, and environmental integrity. Staffers inspected literally every street and back road in the county to inventory and photograph every property meeting minimum requirements for inclusion in the survey.
