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"SEMINAR EIGHT" AT NEW HARMONY

The works of eight upper-level students enrolled in USI's Senior Art Seminar are being presented at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art through January 29. The Gallery is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday and 1-5 p.m. Sundays; it is closed Mondays.

Ms. Theresa A. Armstrong, Mr. Jeff Gann, Ms. Anne M. Hanat, Mr. Peter Hriso, Mr. Randy W. Nester, Ms. Chanda Ramsey, Ms. Natalie Tindle, and Ms. Heather Ziliak are the students featured this year with works in a variety of media - painting, printmaking, photography, graphic design, and wood.

The Senior Art Seminar focuses on preparing students for entry into graduate school and offers information on career options in art-related fields. It was developed by Ms. Kathryn M. Waters, chair of the Art Department.

APPOINTMENT. Ms. Aimee J. Luebben has been appointed as the first director of USI's Occupational Therapy Program, assuming duties on January 2. She will spend the spring semester setting up the program

and reviewing the more than 170 student applications, helping to select the 15 who will enter the first class in Summer II session.

Ms. Luebben was owner/operator of Community Services in Belleville, Illinois, a business she started when Washington University dropped its program of contracting occupational therapy for agencies outside the immediate St. Louis community. She previously was an instructor at Washington, where she had earned B.S. and M.S. degrees in the mid-80s after discovering there was no demand for her original field, teaching Latin. Ms. Luebben will complete Ph.D. course work in occupational therapy in March at Southern Illinois University-Carbondale.

The USI program was approved by state agencies, but no special appropriation was made to begin the program. Demonstrating the demand for occupational therapy training, Evansville's three general hospitals -- Deaconess, St. Mary's, and Welborn -- and the Tri-State Regional Rehabilitation Hospital stepped in to provide \$55,000 in start-up funding.

She received a B.S. degree from USI and M.S.S.W and A.C.S.W. degrees from the University of Louisville. She has been a staff therapist with the Southwestern Indiana Mental Health Center, Inc., and a social worker with Visiting Nurse Association.

"MAKE THE RIGHT CHOICE"

The Metropolitan Evansville Chamber of Commerce in its "Make the Right Choice" program reminds us that parents are very important players on the "Right Choice" team. A parent can affect the child's school success by taking an interest in out-of-school reading, how well and how often homework is completed, how much television is watched, and attendance regularity. Newspapers, magazines, and books in the home and limited TV viewing can promote sharper math skills; regular school attendance leads to better test performance; taking time to check on homework helps the child see that school and home are working as partners.

If you are not a parent, but a caring aunt, uncle, grandparent, or friend, talk with children about school. Two-thirds of eighth graders report they never or rarely discuss classes with adults in the community. We need to let young people know we expect them to do their "job" -- their school work -- just as we must do ours and we will do our best to help them.
