PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. Having just returned from sabbatical, Dr. Darrel Bigham, professor of history, has nearly completed a book, A History of Evansville Blacks, 1818-1932. He has been elected president of the Evansville Arts and Education Council and re-elected president of the Vanderburgh County Historical Society and the Volunteer Action Center.

At the annual meeting of the Southern Historical Association on November 2, he will present a paper entitled "The Impact of the Second World War on the Black Community of Evansville, Indiana."

Dr. Charles Petranek, associate professor of sociology, has just returned from the 16th annual meeting of the International Simulation and Gaming Association in Copenhagen, Denmark, where he presented a paper, "An Experiment in Learning: Simulations or Lecture." At the conference he was re-elected to the Steering Committee. During the trip, Dr. Petranek and his family visited Norway, Sweden, Finland, and Russia.

From August 15 to August 20, **Dr. Yen Tzu Fu**, associate professor of mathematics, attended the joint summer meeting of the American Mathematical Society and the Mathematical Association of America at the University of Oregon in Eugene. He delivered a research paper, "Interpolation by Infinitely Differentiable Function on the Real Line." An abstract of the paper is printed on Abstracts of Papers Presented to the American Mathematical Society, page 300, Volume 5, Issue 33, August 1984.

FELLOWSHIPS AVAILABLE. The Indiana Committee for the Humanities will offer fellowships to Indiana scholars again in 1985. The program, begun last year, awards six stipends of \$4,000 each for two months of independent summer study. This summer, ICH fellows are exploring subjects ranging from the popular music tradition of Black America and literature about farming to the medical treatment of severely defective newborns.

Recipients must be residents of Indiana and have advanced degrees in one of the humanities disciplines. The fellowships are designed in such a way that the general public also benefits from the studies. Each recipient is required to make two public presentations at the conclusion of his/her work.

The deadline for filing applications is January 7, 1985. Guidelines and application forms may be obtained from the Indiana Committee for the Humanities, 3135 North Meridian, Indianapolis, Indiana, 46208, 925-5316.
