USI's Carter Hall will be transformed into a lushly decorated medieval castle for the 36th annual USI Madrigal Feaste featuring the USI Chamber Choir. Set in Renaissance Ireland, the USI Madrigal Feaste will inspire guests through stirring music, festive processions, hearty laughter, and sumptuous delicacies. Tickets are on sale now for USI's oldest musical tradition, a festive way to begin the holiday season.

The USI Chamber Choir will entertain with selections of old English Madrigals, Irish traditional folk songs and carols, as well as eloquent choral selections for the holiday season from a wide variety of European repertory. The Signature Project: Be one in a million

The University community is invited to be part of *The Signature Project*, a work of art involving more than one million participants. Irish-born artist **Patrick Dunning** will introduce his work with a multi-media program from 1 to 2:15 p.m. Monday, November 28, in the University Center Rooms 201-204.

First developed while Dunning was artist-in-residence at the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry (OMSI), *The Signature Project* is a colossal work of art that requires the signatures of over one million people. Through the use of digital technology, Dunning will color code individual signatures to create an enormous painting consisting of 171 individual canvases. When complete, *The Signature Project* will be larger than the surface of a basketball court.

Thirty members of the USI community will be selected to add their signatures to the project. Register through Extended Services for the opportunity to be selected. You must be registered and present at the program in order to participate.

Retirement pursuits: John Gottcent

When **John Gottcent**, professor of English and founding director of the University Core Curriculum, joined USI, the English department was so small that everybody had to be a generalist, he said. "In my first three years here, I taught 15 different courses. I was helping out in all different kinds of fields."

Gottcent arrived at USI in 1970, trained as a specialist in 19th century British literature, but has rarely taught a course in it. Instead, he became an expert on biblical literature. "The English department decided in the late seventies that we needed a course on the literature of the Bible, because our majors were having difficulty recognizing biblical references in standard literature. I was assigned the project of designing the course. I didn't want to do it because I had no background or training in it, but I ended up getting interested in it. It's been very successful and has expanded from one course to two."

Gottcent's Concept of Evil course was inspired by a friend who took a course on the devil in literature, which he expanded to evil in literature. "I introduced it in the seventies and it proved to be very popular. I've been teaching it ever since. I'm teaching it this semester."

"My wife always says I'm trying to play it safe by teaching evil one semester and the Bible the other."

After retirement, he is looking forward to pursuing a more systematic study of Hebrew and Greek, the languages of the Old and New Testaments, and plans to pursue a writing project that draws on his interest in biblical studies. He also would like to teach an occasional course at USI.

He and his wife JoAnne plan to travel, and eventually relocate to an area "with less heat and humidity in the summer."

"I wouldn't be completely honest if I didn't admit that I also will spend a good amount of time playing with my model train collection," he added.

During his USI career, Gottcent has served on the Executive Council of the national board of the Association for General and Liberal Studies; was state faculty representative for the Indiana Commission for Higher Education appointed by the governor in the mid-nineties; and was chosen by his colleagues as the USI Integra Bank Distinguished Professor in 2000.

He said though he'd miss USI, "After 36 years, it's time for a change, both for the University and for me."

Taste Spirits in Harmonie

When George Rapp and the Harmonie Society settled in New Harmony, Indiana, in 1814, wine and beer making soon followed. Rapp wrote to his adopted son Frederick on November 8, 1814, "I expect to make enough wine after a while. The region and location for it is excellent."

In that spirit, Historic New Harmony presents "Spirits in Harmonie" from 5 to 9 p.m. Saturday, November 26.

"Spirits in Harmonie" features wine, beer, and cider tasting, festive food, live music, and unique shopping from around the

world in a variety of historical venues.

"This is a perfect alternative to fighting the traffic and crowds at the mall during the first weekend of the holiday season," said **Connie Weinzapfel**, Historic New Harmony director.

"Mad Cowboy" screening

The USI Vegetarian Club will present a screening of the documentary film "Mad Cowboy" at 7 p.m. Monday, November 28, in Kleymeyer Hall in the Liberal Arts Center. Evansville native Marissa Miller, animal projects coordinator for the Global Green Foundation, will introduce the documentary and lead a discussion after the screening.

"Mad Cowboy" follows the story of Howard Lyman, a former cattle rancher turned vegetarian and food safety activist. In 1996, Lyman discussed how the cattle industry potentially exposed Americans to mad cow disease by feeding cows the remains of live animals, including other cows, on *The Oprah Winfrey Show*. As a result of his remarks, and Winfrey's declaration that she'd never eat a burger again, Lyman was named a co-defendant in the infamous "veggie libel" case brought by Texas ranchers in Amarillo.

The documentary is based on Lyman's book, *Mad Cowboy: Plain Truth from the Cattle Rancher Who Won't Eat Meat*.
