

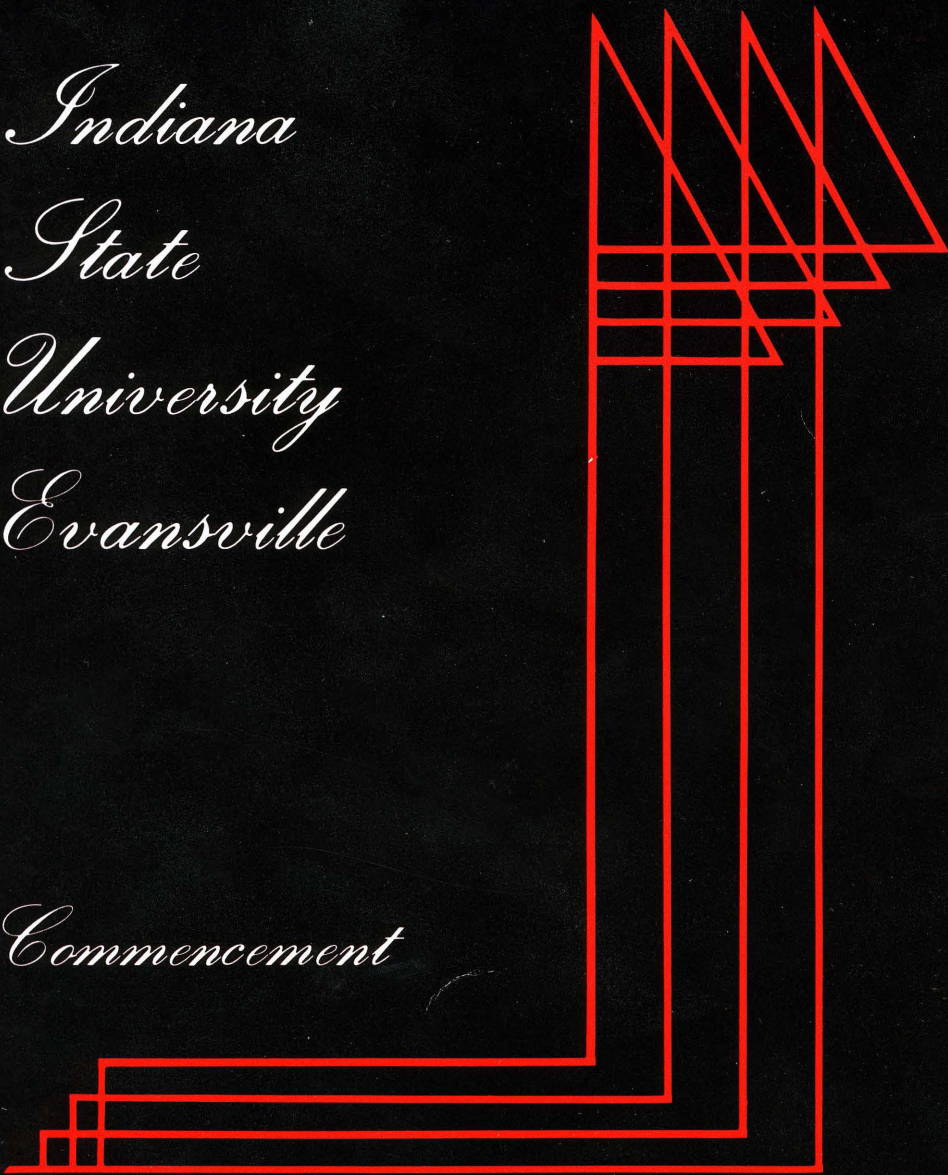

Address Graduates

The President of Indiana State University, Alan C. Rankin, will address the 1975 graduates of the Evansville Campus. President Rankin has served as President of Indiana State University since 1965, and he has been a strong advocate of the Evansville Campus. His tenure as President of Indiana State University parallels the first decade of developments of the Evansville Campus which began in 1965. President Rankin notes that one of his great satisfactions as President was working with the emerging Evansville Campus. "It was not always an easy task. It has not been accomplished without some misunderstandings. There are some who thought we moved too slowly. There are some who thought we moved too rapidly . . . I am grateful for this collaboration which has brought new friends, provided a needed educational service, and has proved its worth in every diploma which bears the name of Indiana State University."

Before coming to Indiana State Uni-

versity, President Rankin was Vice-Chancellor for Student and General Affairs at the University of Pittsburgh. He had served at the University of Pittsburgh since 1956 in various administrative capacities.

A native of Hays, Kansas, Dr. Rankin completed his undergraduate study at Fort Hays Kansas State College in 1937. His graduate study was at Syracuse University where he earned the Master of Arts degree in political science and the Doctor of Social Science degree.

In 1940, Dr. Rankin went to the Canal Zone as a student personnel assistant for the Panama Canal and later became Chief of the Research and Service Bureau of the Panama Canal. In World War II, he enlisted as a private in the United States Army and served as Chief of the Salary and Wage Administration Section of the Panama Canal Department and the Caribbean Defense Command. Subsequently, he was commissioned as a Captain in the Army Reserve.



After World War II, Dr. Rankin was on the Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, faculty for eight years – first as an Instructor in Government and then as Assistant Professor of Government. While at Miami University, he was on a two-year leave of absence in Japan where he was consultant to the National Personnel Authority in the reorganization of the Japanese Civil Service. In Japan, he was a civilian employee of the Department of Army in General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters.

In 1954, he went to Indonesia to participate in a public administration study for the Ford Foundation and Cornell University. From 1954 to 1956, he was associated with Cornell University as Assistant Professor of Administration and Director of Student Personnel in the Graduate School of Business and Public

Administration.

During his decade of service in higher education in the State of Indiana, President Rankin soon became the "Statesman for Indiana public higher education." President Rankin is past president of the Indiana Conference of Higher Education comprised of over forty Indiana colleges and universities. In 1973 President Rankin served as chairman of the Committee on Federal Relations of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and on the Commission on Federal Relations of the American Council on Education. The national pre-eminence of President Rankin in higher education was recognized by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities in 1974 by selecting him to deliver the President to Presidents Lecture.

A world traveler, President Rankin has traveled widely in Europe, Latin America, the Middle East, and the Orient.

He is a member of many professional organizations, and has written for the *National Municipal Review*, *Administrative Science Quarterly*, *Komuin* (Japan), *Personnel Administration*, and other journals.

Dr. Rankin and his wife, the former Frances Goodnough Atkins, have one daughter, Lynn, a 1971 Indiana University graduate.

In recognition of a distinguished decade of commitment to leadership and service, Dr. Rankin will be receiving an honorary doctorate degree, Doctor of Humanities, from Indiana State University during the Commencement exercises today.

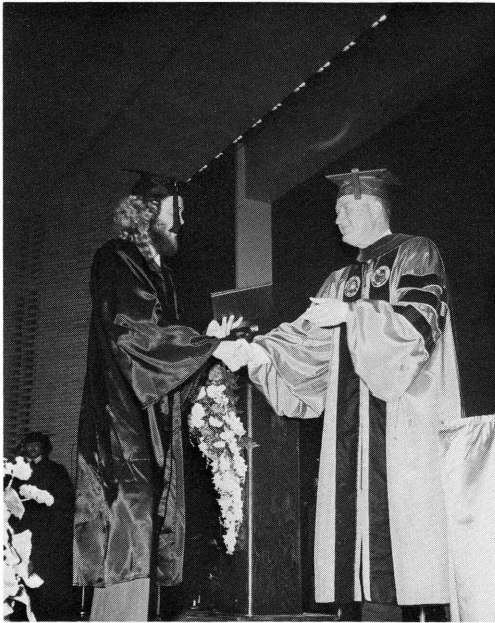

SCHOLARSHIP HONORS

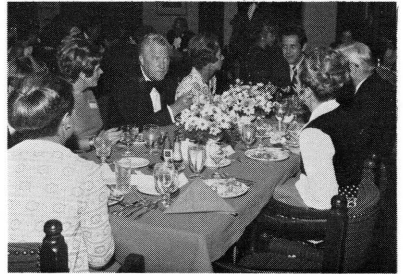

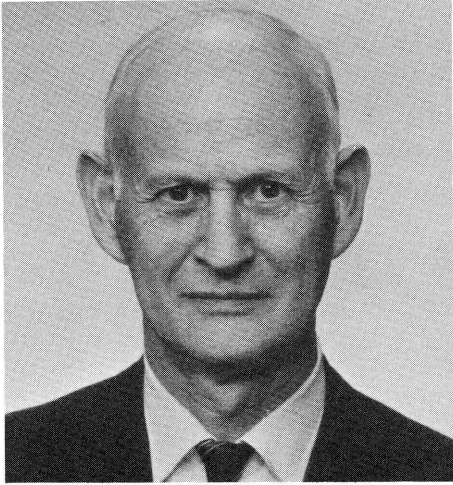

D. Bailey Merrill is senior partner of the Evansville law firm of Merrill, Schroeder, Johnson, and Evans, who has distinguished himself by serving as Eighth District Congressman to the United States Congress in 1953 and 1954. Academic Dress

The academic costume dates from medieval days when university students wore woolen and fur garments for warmth in damp and drafty buildings. Most of those studying were clerics in the holy orders; they wore a cloak to which was attached a hood that could be pulled up to cover their tonsured heads. Simplified today, the costume serves to remind us that its wearer is a member of an ancient and venerable profession; it also indicates by its color and design its wearer's degree and the institution by which the degree was conferred.

In the United States, black has been the traditional color for academic gowns, but some institutions authorize holders of their doctorates to wear the colors of the institution. The bachelor's gown is

distinguished by its long, open sleeves; the master's by its closed, slitted sleeves; the doctor's by its full sleeves trimmed with bands of velvet, which may be black or a color denoting the field in which the degree was taken.

The mortarboard cap, proper for all degrees, is black. Tassels, usually black, are worn over the left front quarter of the cap. Holders of the doctorate may wear tassels of gold thread.

Academic hoods vary in length according to the degree and are lined with the colors of the institution by which the degree was granted. The honorary doctoral hoods of Indiana State University are black, lined with blue satin with white satin chevrons. They are edged with velvet trimming of black to match the gown.
